My beloved Holy Trinity family,

Hronia Polla! As celebrate the 100th anniversary of our spiritual home and family—Holy Trinity Church—we are filled with thanks for the vision, sacrifices and dedication of those who bonded together in the Spirit back in 1923 to form and name this blessed community.

As stated in the Parish History on our website, "When St. Nicholas Church, the only Greek church in Pittsburgh, was moved from Wiley Avenue downtown to the then distant Oakland district, the establishment of another Greek Orthodox Church in the densely Hellenic populated area of North Side, was necessitated. As a result, Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church was established on at the corner of Sandusky Street and Stockton Avenue. Rev. Nicholas Papavasilis performed the first church services in April 1923."

From that founding Liturgy to today, this community has been filled with blessings and life in abundance, two attributes of the Holy Spirit attested to in the quote above taken from the prayer to the right: blessings and life. We are eternally grateful to those who have gone before us and laid the foundations of the parish and family with which we are blessed today: from the Apostles on whom the Holy Spirit descended at Pentecost (now beautifully witnessed by our new iconography) to our forefathers and mothers through whom the Holy Spirit continued to work wonders, making that which was "impossible with man possible with God" (Luke 18.26).



the Spirit of Truth, everywhere present and filling all things, Treasury of blessings and Giver of Life, come and dwell in us, cleanse from every stain, and save our souls, O Good One.

Now, in our 100th year, it is up to us to look toward the next 100 and embrace the reality that what we have received is not ours by right or by the fruits of our own labors alone; it is an inheritance with which we have been entrusted and are forever thankful. PARENTING TOWARD THE KINGDOM

Nurturing disciples of Christ and raising children Who understand that they are citizens of heaven

"The Orthodox Bookshelf" is a Holy Trinity Herald column by Rick Paese focusing on books of Orthodox Christian interest for everyone. Many of the books highlighted are available for purchase at the Three Hierarchs Bookstore in the Gallery.

Introduction

What is the goal of a parent? Obedience from our children? Good behavior? Straight "A's?" Having complete control? Peaceful lives? "Parenting Toward the Kingdom" by Dr. Philip Mamalakis says no to all of these short term goals. Instead, he advocates for a long term outlook. Our true goal as Orthodox Christians is to ensure our children know God's love and how to walk in His ways. It is about nurturing disciples of Christ and raising children who understand that they are citizens of heaven. We need to help our children align their wills with God's will, rather than be enslaved to their impulses. How to do that is what "Parenting Toward the Kingdom" is all about. Pulling from the wisdom of the church fathers, scripture, and practical examples, Dr. Mamalakis tackles many important issues parents face, including how to let your children struggle, responding to misbehavior, setting limits and consequences, and dealing with our mistakes.

Let Them Struggle

It is very tempting to remove our children's suffering. We should not do this. Instead we should walk with

them through their struggles, guiding and encouraging them in the process. We do them harm in the long run if we are always removing their hardships. The true path of success in life involves struggle. It is a struggle to become holy. Our children cannot learn this if we do not let them struggle. Instead, we should name their struggles and frame them in the context of the Christian virtues. Naming their struggles communicates empathy and helps them learn how to identify and manage their emotions on their own as they grow. This is a good strategy for a long term outlook, even if it does not give immediate results.

Respond, Don't React

A key theme throughout the book is the idea of responding to misbehavior instead of reacting. Responding is purposeful and focused on teaching. "Responding means recognizing every misbehavior as an opportunity to teach." When we react, we give into our immediate emotions and miss an opportunity to help our child mature.

Set Limits, Limit Consequences

Giving consequences for bad behavior is necessary, but should not be the first thing we do. It works, but there may be an easier way. Setting limits can be a better alternative. Settling limits teaches children the Christian virtues and helps them to learn how to set limits for themselves as they get older and live their lives within God's limits. The book gives



several techniques for setting limits.

Repent

We all make mistakes as parents. Dr. Mamalakis identifies several common mistakes parents make and how to avoid them. These mistakes include, reacting too guickly with a punishment, getting angry, being lenient, micromanaging, and being critical. But the risk of reading a parenting book is feeling overwhelmed with our many shortcomings and overcompensating by obsessing about always trying to do the "right" thing. Thankfully, we can turn our failures into an opportunity. Failure allows us to demonstrate how to live a life of repentance and forgiveness.

Be Holy

Dr. Mamalakis says we ultimately need to live a spiritual life and acquire the Holy Spirit. Otherwise, everything else we do will be in vain. When we are holy, this will positively impact our kids. Ultimately, kids need more than consequences and limits. They need a connection with us. They need us to demonstrate what a holy life looks like. And they need us to walk beside them to help them navigate life's struggles. It is not easy, but it is fulfilling. Dr. Mamalakis presents a parenting mindset that I can very much relate to: "Our children are not here to make our lives peaceful. Full, yes, but peaceful, not so much."❖



TRUTH

The Lord seeks the truth from us because it is more pleasing to God for humans to act righteously and truly than to offer sacrifices and offerings.

ruth is the hallmark of the virtuous life. To speak the truth is the responsibility of every human being and we owe it to ourselves and to those around us. Those who speak the truth honor themselves first and then those listening. Those who speak the truth to their neighbor pay them the honor they deserve. For those who listen, as rational beings, have the right to learn the truth when they ask. Truth adorns those who confess it with elegant layers of garments. First, it perfects them in virtue because truth is the perfector of virtue: and second, truth likens those who confess it to God, who is Absolute Truth. Truth is the secure understanding of being, that is, of what is. God is Truth because He is Light, Truth and Life, as the knowledge of truth is knowledge of God, who Is True Being. Those who speak the truth abide in God, and God in them (1 Jn. 4.16).

Saint John Chrysostom says, nothing is more manifest or more powerful than the truth, just as nothing is more powerless than a lie. Truth stands naked to all those who wish to examine it from every angle. It does not wish to hide; it does not consider dangers; nor does it fear fraudulent schemes? Clement of Alexandria says: Truth is one, just as virtue is one according to its power.

It is said by some that Truth is not a concept, but a Person, and that Person is Jesus Christ.

One is the way of truth, our Lord Jesus Christ. Through our Lord Jesus Christ we ascend to the Father and become sons and daughters of God. Truth leads to the perfection and exact state of virtue. Truth is the science of virtue, while the ethos of virtue is the knowledge of truth. Truth, by the actions of virtue, keeps our souls healthy and guards our moral vigor. Truth is an innate knowledge of the Divine and a fervent desire for God.

Why is truth so important in our daily Christian life?"

Theodoritos says: The truth of the dogmas of the Gospel is to the practitioners of godliness what the foundation is to a house and the keel to a ship. The Lord seeks the truth from us because it is more pleasing to God for humans to act righteously and truly than to offer sacrifices and offerings. Truth is a great commandment of the Lord. It means letting your yes be yes and no be no (Mt. 5.37), calling light light and darkness darkness. The power of truth is in need of no help whatsoever. Even if a thousand people still try to erase it, not only will it

not disappear, but it will emerge all the more radiantly shining through those who try to disparage it. Nothing is stronger than the truth. The truth prevails always and everywhere. She is as beautiful as the daughter of Uranus. Her grace is alluring and her image, wherever it appears, brightens the countenance of souls. On the face of truth shines kindness, innocence, gentleness, goodness and piety. Truth is adorned with virtue, steeped in holiness and breathes forth the fragrance of myrrh!

What does being truthful say about us as followers of Jesus Christ, Who is the "Way, the Truth and the Life?"

Those who speak the truth are virtuous, honorable, worthy, good and righteous. They have a pure heart and their lips do not lie. The eyes of all people are turned toward those who are truthful and their fellowship is desired by all. They are Christians not just in form but in spirit. The crown of righteousness shall be placed on them on the day of recompense.
