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

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of the most powerful words used to describe the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, which

we are preparing to celebrate on May 1 as Orthodox Christians, is "transforming." Of all the single events in the history of the world, one would be hard-pressed to find one that has transformed more than Jesus rising from the tomb. It transformed the faith and lives of the Apostles and all His followers; it transformed Jewish temples into Christian churches; it transformed Israel of the Old Testament into the New Israel of the New Covenant; it transformed nations into Christian kingdoms; it transformed the slavery of sin to freedom in Christ; it transformed death to life; it transformed the world and led us to Heaven.

For each of us, however, the most important question is this: "HAS IT TRANSFORMED ME?" This is a question that must be asked not once at Pascha, but continuously through the year and throughout our life. According to the perspective offered by Fr. Thomas Hopko above, just as there is no part of the world that has not been touched and transformed by the Resurrection of Christ, so there should not be one aspect of our self and our life that is not affected. There are a few ways to check this:

- Does prayer play a part in the decisions I face and the choices I make in my personal life, my work and elsewhere? Do I bother asking God?
- Would my life be any different if I was not a Christian? Would anyone know?
- Does what I do privately reflect what my personal beliefs are? Am I equally committed to my faith when nobody is watching?
- Do my choices, actions and words in public and private bear witness to Christ as a light on a hill, or do I try to conceal it so nobody notices?
- Have I "reserved" areas of my life to myself and not given them to God?

There are many other aspects of our life that can be examined, but all of them point back to the same question we should be asking while holding the brightly burning Paschal candle: "HAS IT TRANSFORMED <u>ME</u>?"

The Apostles did not set the world on fire by their own power; it was the power of the uncreated light of the Resurrection that they carried in their hearts and proclaimed to "those in darkeness." The God of life and resurrection has given us the same charge: take that light to all the world, and the world is certainly as much in need of it now as then. First, however, make sure the "pilot light" stays lit in our heart. Only then will Pascha be a celebration, not an observation; only then will we be able to say, "Christ is risen ... IN ME!" Kali Anastasi!

Make Plans for the Anastasi Dinner..... April 30

Don't forget to make plans to attend the Resurrection Liturgy and Dinner at Holy Trinity Church, Saturday evening, April 30/Sunday May 1. Following the liturgical celebration of the Resurrection, join your family, friends and other members of Holy Trinity to break the fast and celebrate the feast in our church hall. We will be serving lamb, "avgolemono" soup, bread, cheese and olives and "paximadia." Free-will offerings will be accepted to help cover the costs of the meal.

Lenten Fasting and Confession

In addition to the special services being held, please remember that the main focus of Lent is a personal one, with increased attention to our spiritual life through prayer, fasting and Holy Confession. The Holy Canons of the Church prescribe the guidelines for the Great Lenten Fast, beginning on Pure Monday. Orthodox Christians are called to refrain from eating meat (including red meat, poultry, etc.), dairy (milk, eggs, cheese), fish and other animal products through Pascha. We are also to abstain from wine and olive oil during weekdays (Monday through Friday). Shellfish, vegetables, pastas and the like are permitted at all times. If you have any questions—especially if you are new to fasting or have special health conditions—please see Fr. John with spe-

cific questions. Please also see Fr. John to set up a time for Holy Confession. *Kali Metanoia! (May your repentance be good!)*

Lenten Coffee Hour Reminder March 14-Apr 30

Please keep in mind that during the Lenten season our Coffee Hours following the Divine Liturgy is observing the Orthodox Lenten fasting schedule. Anyone sponsoring a memorial coffee hour or providing Church School snacks is asked to take care that non-meat and non-dairy items are provided. SUMMER CAMP 2005 INFO!

ATTENTION SUMMER CAMP PARENTS: THIS IS REALLY IMPORTANT INFORMATION!

Summer Camp 2005 is not that far away! As always, our Metropolis has requested each parish to support this important ministry. At Holy Trinity, this takes the form of parish grants offered to the campers of our parish, thanks to the generous support of the Philoptochos, the Parish Council and other donors (see below). This program resulted in our best-ever Summer Camp attendance last year, with 32 children attending from Holy Trinity (one of the highest parishes in the Metropolis!).

Important: In order to qualify for the largest discount, parents of children who participate in our Church School ministry and JOY/GOYA ministries must submit a copy of their mailed child(ren)'s camp application(s) to Father John by April 15 to indicate that their child(ren) will be attending. (Only the application page, not the medical form). Late applications will not qualify for the Holy Trinity discount. (Please note: our "Holy Trinity" weeks this year are Week I for JOY and Week V for GOYA.)

The original application(s), payment & medical form(s) must be mailed <u>directly to the Metropolis post-marked by April 15</u> for the best discount. Enclose a check for the "Net fee" amount listed below and check the "Parish Scholarship" box in the financial section of the form to indicate that balance of payment from Holy Trinity is to follow. 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
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Holy Trinity General Assembly Approves Cemetery Chapel

A historic moment in the life of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church took place on Sunday, February 6, at a Special General Assembly convened to consider final approval of the Holy Trinity Cemetery Chapel project. The well-attended assembly was presented with drawings for the chapel based on a design by noted Byzantine architect Chris Kamages of CJK Design Group, with modifications by Bill Fiedler, Cemetery Committee chairman. Finanaces of the project were also reviewed, including the announcement of a recent donation of \$100,000 by Nicholas Vlahakis. After a discussion period, the project was approved by a near-unanimous vote. Additionally, the committee brought forth a motion to give the name of "Saint George Chapel" to the church. The name was unanimously approved by the assembly. Look for updates as the project progresses.

Prayer and Confession On Our Lips

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

How many times we keep on praying and yet feel that we do not get any response to our prayers! We wonder why it is so.

The Psalmist gave us the answer long ago. He wrote,

"If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear me." If there are hidden sins in our lives, if our lives are not in right relationship out of order with God and men, surely the Lord will not hear us.

We all need to search our hearts during this Great Lent to find our unconfessed and unforgiven iniquity and confess it to God, so that the Lord may bless us through His forgiveness when we pray.

"God be merciful to me a sinner." (Luke 18:13)

The story of the two men praying in the temple tells us that they both expressed their attitudes by their words. One was self righteous and arrogant. The other confessed that he was a sinner and begged for God's mercy.

First of all, confession means that we recognize that we are sinners, and we make our confession openly and honestly. Confession of this kind deepens our spiritual lives

But confession also tells us what we believe in. When we pray for forgiveness of sin, we confess our belief in Christ and what He can do for us.

"Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips." (Isaiah 6:5)

Prayer is opening the door of our lives to God. When we turn toward Him we are able to see ourselves as we really are, in our true state and condition. When we expose ourselves to God, we see our need for cleansing. We see our need for healing, we see our need for forgiveness, and we cry out as did Isaiah, "Woe is me, for I am undone!; because I am a man of unclean lips." Like the publican in the parable of Jesus, we cry, "God be merciful to me a sinner."

When our attitude is right toward God and we have

confessing hearts, we come from prayer - justified, forgiven, healed by the divine touch of Jesus Christ.

"If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:8 9)

Modern man tries to escape his sense of guilt. But guilt is persistent. God's voice (our conscience) within us will not be stilled. Our attempt to still it leads to further problems.

St. John the Evangelist reminds us that there is only one way to get rid of guilt. That way is through confession and forgiveness. Our part is to confess. We have the divine promise of forgiveness. God's call to confess our sins never ceases.

Beloved, Lent prepares us for a renewal of our spiritual life. We learn that self denial is not a purpose in itself, but only a means for positive and determined action. In preparation for and during the period of Great Lent, we learn many things that enable us to fight all evil and return to the contrite Christian life.

REMEMBER GREAT LENT AND KEEP IT HOLY.



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On the Resurrection of the Dead

"I look for the resurrection of the dead". In the Creed we confess that we expect the resurrection of the dead. Of course, when we say the resurrection of the dead, we mean the resurrection of bodies. Bodies, which are separated from the soul at death, will be resurrected, i.e. the souls will return to their bodies and will give them life. The entire man should live eternally.

All bodies will be resurrected, those of the righteous and the unrighteous, saints and sinners alike. Thus, we can talk of the "restoration of nature", not, however, of the restoration of will. The gift of resurrection will be given to all men, the righteous and unrighteous alike. Hence, everyone will be resurrected, but it is only the righteous who will be caught up "in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air" (I Thessalonians 4:17).

Christ's resurrection is a prelude to our own resurrection. The saints already enjoy the resurrection of the body, the abolition of death and the fact that the departure of the soul from the body is really a sleep. We can also enjoy this great truth. The relics of saints are proof that the saints are sleeping and that death has been abolished. Their incorruptible bodies, which give of sweet smelling fragrances and work miracles, are a foretaste of the coming resurrection. Thus, Church's task is to inake man's body a "relic".

The resurrection of the dead will certainly happen. We have Christ's absolute confirmation of this. However, we do not know when it will happen. The time of Christ's Second Coming is unknown; even the angels do not know when it will happen, Only God the Father knows.



The resurrected bodies will be spiritual. St. Paul writes concerning the subject "So also is the resurrection of the dead. The body is sown in corruption, it is raised in incorruption. It is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body" (I Corinthians 15:42 44).

This will take place for those who have fallen asleep. However, regarding those people who will still be alive at the moment of the Second Coming of Christ, St. Paul says that they will immediately change, "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye" (I Corinthians 15: 51 52).
