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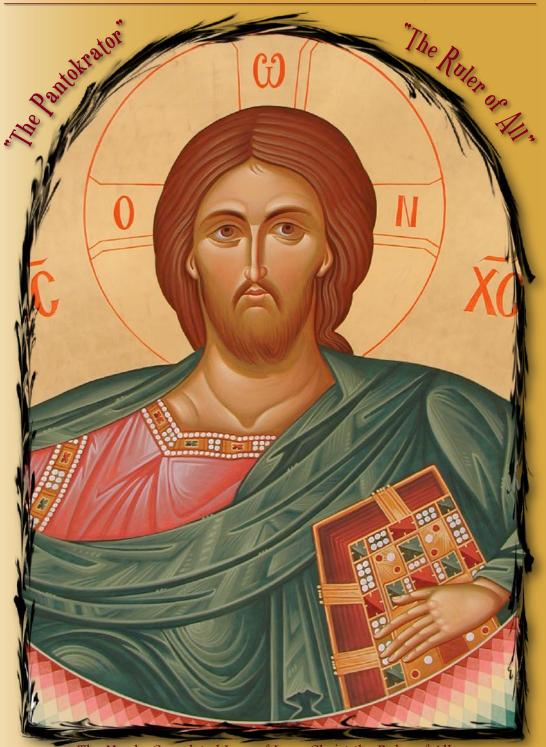

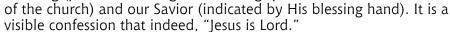
Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

It was a moment in Holy Trinity history I wish we could have all shared together: Monday, March 19,

2008. I received a call from our iconographer, Florin, who with great joy and thanksgiving called to let me know, "Father John, the Pantokrator is done!" It was more than just an announcement. To re-phrase it in the light of another more famous event, it was "one small step for an iconographer, one giant leap for a community."

Why the significance? Well, it has less to do with painting and more to do with purpose. With the completion of the "writing" of that icon (that is how the Faith refers to process of creating icons), a few important things happened:

• For the first time in the 85-year history of the community, this parish now has joined the centuries-old tradition of Orthodox churches from Jerusalem to Constantinople to Mount Athos to America in adorning a Byzantinestyle church crowned by a traditional dome with the icon of Jesus Christ Who is, as the passage from Isaiah says above, our Judge (indicated by the closed Gospel in His hand), our Ruler (indicated by the title of the icon), our King (placed at the highest or ruling spot

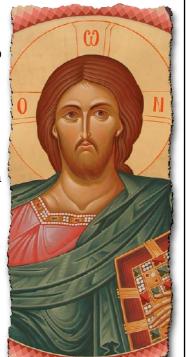


- This is now the first icon completed in the holy task of adorning the interior of the Saint George Chapel. This, as we anticipate progress on our new church project, we have melded the history of dedication and love for our forbears and founders with the enthusiasm of this generation by first presenting this gift of tradition to the chapel in their memory and then moving on toward the new church with an equal dedication toward traditional Orthodox design for this and future generations.
- Finally, we have truly stepped into a more complete and visible form of witness to our own mission: "To proclaim and live the Orthodox Christian Faith in its fullness as faithful members of the Body of Christ." May that image be seen even more powerfully in us as "living icons" than it is in the dome!

Be sure along the way to stop by the Chapel and see it for yourself May our Lord grant us all a fruitful Lenten journey.

As always, our Church School ministry will be active during the upcoming Lenten season. Among the activities our students will participate in are:

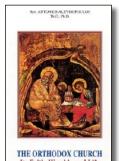
- The Sunday of Orthodoxy Procession with icons on March 16. Remember to bring your icon to Liturgy!

Lenten Coffee Hour Reminder March 16 - April 20

Please keep in mind that during the Lenten season our Coffee Hours following the Divine Liturgy will be observing the Orthodox Lenten fasting schedule. Anyone sponsoring a memorial coffee hour or providing Church School snacks is asked to take care that non-meat and non-dairy items are provided. The Philoptochos and the Church School can provide a list of suggestions for good alternatives. Thank you for helping our community grow in this proper and helpful Orthodox spiritual practice and discipline.

Lenten Fasting and Confession

In addition to the special services being held, please remember that the main focus of Lent is a personal one, with increased attention to our spiritual life through prayer, fasting and Holy Confession. Since spiritual discipline is also required, the Holy Canons of the Church prescribe the guidelines for the Great Lenten Fast, beginning this year on Pure Monday, March 10. Orthodox Christians are called to refrain from eating meat (including red meat, poultry, etc.), dairy (milk, eggs, cheese), fish and other animal products through Pascha. We are also to abstain from wine and olive oil during weekdays (Monday through Friday). Shellfish, vegetables, pastas and the like are permitted at all times. If you have any questions—especially if you are new to fasting or have special health conditions—please see see the Fasting Guidelines on page 12 or speak with Fr. John about specific questions. Please also see Fr. John to set up a time for Holy Confession during the Lenten season. Kali Metanoia! (May your repentance be good!)

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT SUNDAY OF ORTHODOXY MARCH 16

The Sunday of Orthodoxy has been observed by our Holy Church for over one thousand years commemorating the final victory of Orthodoxy over the iconoclasts, those who denied paying homage to the sacred icons and sacred objects used by the Church.

The Seventh Ecumenical Council, the last truly Ecumenical one, assembled in 787 a.d. in the

city of Nicea. Representatives of all the Patriarchates were present. The Holy Fathers of the Holy Council discussed the basis for the use of icons whose use was forbidden by Emperor Leo the III in 726. The Holy Fathers proved that icons were very necessary for religious teaching and the perfecting of Christian morals.

There was a persecution of those who took a heroic stand in defense of their faith. Many dedicated monks became martyrs for their beliefs. Many bishops were imprisoned and tortured.

The controversy on the use of icons continued and in the ninth century the issue was settled in favor of the use of icons.

their belief in the Orthodox teachings.

It was not until the memorable Sunday in 843 that the Orthodox teaching finally triumphed. On the first Sunday of Lent in the year 843 the veneration of icons was proclaimed in the Cathedral of Hagia Sophia in Constantinople. Throughout the centuries the Church has commemorated "The Triumph of Orthodoxy." Each year the faithful re-affirm their beliefs in the sacred images and relics and pro-claim

Today all Orthodox Catholic Churches are richly adorned with icons. They are our "Windows into Heaven." They help make a church a place "where God has His dwelling place among men." Icons are an aid to instruction, to meditation, to prayer. They help raise our thoughts to Christ and His Saints

What Does The Commemoration Of The "Triumph Of Orthodoxy" Mean To Us Today?

It is a day for us to rededicate ourselves to the task of serving Christ and His Church. It is a day to profess our Orthodox

Catholic Faith, to proclaim that the Orthodox Catholic Church is the ONE, HOLY, and APOSTOLIC Church. It is a day to open our hearts to Christ that He may triumph over our lives.

THE GIFT OF PATIENCE

PATIENCE is love expressed in vexing situations. PATIENCE is LOVE IN WAITING or WAITING IN LOVE.

Hello, my precious children!

My little sister, Zoe, sometimes asks our Mommy, "Do you love me?" Did you know that Jesus also asked the same question to Saint Peter (John 21:15)? My precious children, this



an important question for us because God tells us that we should love Him "with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind" (Luke 10:27).

Also, Jesus says that if we truly love Him, then we will do what He says: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14:15). His ways are not always easy, and sometimes your friends will not like them at all. But remember, God can see what we cannot, and His is working everything for our good: "We know that in everything God works for good with those who love him, who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

Today, I want to chat with you about respect and disrespect. Do you remember that Cain, the son of Adam and Eve, was the first one to commit the sin of jealousy? He

was jealous of his brother Abel's offerings to God. Well, Cain was not only jealous of Abel, he was also disrespectful of God and the way He received their offerings. So even though God told them both bring their best gifts as offerings, Cain was not willing to listen. What does it mean to bring your best gift? We know that Cain was a farmer and Abel was a shepherd. Their sacrifice to God came from their daily work. Imagine what their discussion might have been like.

Abel: "What are you doing there?"

Cain: "This is my offering."

Abel: "Wow, it doesn't look that great. Are you sure those are your best fruits and vegetable?"

Cain: "That is what I'm offering and I don't care if you have a problem with it. Mind your own business."

So, maybe the reason God accepted Abel's offerings but didn't like Cain's was that Can might have offered the worst of his crops and Abel offered the best of his flocks. And it only god worse from there. Cain got so angry and jealous of Abel that he took him out into the field an killed him!

Have you ever done that thing that your parents call "throwing a fit?" Even if nobody was around to hear you or to be hurt, you are still being attacked by anger. And remember, like God told Cain, "If you do not do well, sin is couching at the door; its desire is for you, but you must master it" (Genesis 4:7). So we must always remember that we displease and disrespect God when we allow ourselves to be taken over by these kinds of fits. They are very dangerous.

As we head into Lent this year, maybe a good thing for all my precious little ones would be to just ask themselves, "How would I rate myself on respect and disrespect?" How we treat others is a good way to find out. Every day we make choices to respect or disrespect our parents, family members, teachers and friends.

Τό 1821 όλοι άνεξερέτως οί Ελληνες μέ άγώνες καί μεγάλες θυσίες μέχρι θανάτου πλήρωσαν μέ τό αίμα τους, γιά νά έλευθερώσουν τήν άγαπημένη τους Πατρίδα πού στέναζε κάτω άπό τήν άπάνθρωπη σκλαβιά 400 χρόνων.

Όλοι τους είναι άθάνατοι ήρωες καί δέν πρέπει νά τό ξεχνάμε καί νά

περνούν σχεδόν άπαρατήρητα τέτοια ίστορικά γεγονότα.

Θά πρέπει μέ κάθε θυσία νά μάθουν τά παιδιά καί τά έγγόνια μας τήν ένδοξη ίστορία μας καί νά είναι περήφανα.

Σήμερα θά άναφέρω δυό ήρωικά νησιά πού πολέμησαν καί αύτά παλληκαρίσια καί έχυσαν μέχρι σταγόνα τό αίμα τους γιά τήν Ελευθερία τής Πατρίδας των. Καί μέ αύτήν τήν θυσίαν τους κατάφεραν νά συγκινήσουν όλα τά Κράτη καί νά προσφέρουν καί αύτά τήν βοήθεια καί τήν συμπαράστασί τους στόν ένδοξο Ελληνικό Λαό. ΑΥΤΑ ΕΙΝΑΙ Η ΧΙΟΣ ΚΑΙ ΤΑ ΨΑΡΑ.

Η ΚΑΤΑΣΤΡΟΦΗ ΤΗΣ ΧΙΟΥ

ΚΑΝΑΡΗΣ΄...Ταυτόχρονα μέ τήν άλλη Ελλάδα Επαναστάτησαν καί τά Νησιά,πρώτο δέ μεταξύ τών Νησιών ή Χιος. Μάλιστα οί Ελληνες κατώρθωσαν νά έλευθερώσουν τήν Χίο,καί νά

Άναγκάσουν τούς Τούρκους νά κλειστούν σ'ένα φρούριο.

Ό Σουλτάνος θύμωσε μέ τά γεγονότα αύτά καί διάταξε τόν στόλο του νά πλεύση στήν Χίο μέ 7000 στρατό,ό μικρός Ελληνικός στρατός δέν μπόρεσε νά άποκρούση τόν στρατό τού Σουλτάνου. Τότε όλο τό νησί παραδόθηκε στήν καταστροφή ή πόλις της Χίου καί 40 χωριά κάηκαν,άπό τίς 100 χιλιάδες πληθυσμό 23 χιλιάδες έσφάγησαν καί 48 χιλιάδες πουλήθηκαν σάν δούλοι. Οί άλλοι κάτοικοι πού άπόμειναν σκορπίστηκαν στά βουνά καί στής σπηλιές τού Νησιού.

Ετσι τό μυροβόλο Νησί ή ώραία Χίος έρημώθηκε.

Αλλά τό κακούργημα τής Χίου δέν έμεινε άτιμώρητο. Ό Ελληνικός στόλος μέ Αρχηγό τόν Κανάρη, πού ήταν άπό τά ψαρά έφθασε στήν Χίο, ό Κανάρης μέ τόν Πιπίνο άλλο Ναυαρχο άπό τήν Υδρα άποφάσισαν νά κάψουν τόν Τούρκικο Στόλο μέ πυρπολικα Κάθε ένας διάλεξε 20 συντρόφους, ύστερα μπήκαν μέσα σέ δυό βάρκες καί έδεσαν σέ κάθε μιά ένα πυρπολικό.

Τά πυρπολικά ήταν μικρές βάρκες γεμάτες εύφλεκτες ούσίες, όπως θειάφι,πίσσα καί λοιπά,τά κολούσαν στά πλευρά τών μεγάλων Καραβιών καί τά άναβαν. Επαιρναν άμέσως φωτιά καί μετέδιδαν τήν φωτιά στά Καράβια τά όποία καμωμένα άπό ξύλα άναβαν άμέσως καί γίνοντας παρανάλωμα πυρός. Στό λιμάνι τής Χίου ήταν άγκυροβολημένος ό Τούρκικος Στόλος, μέ δυό μεγάλα πλοία,τήν Ναυαρχίδα καί τήν ύποναυαρχίδα. Οί

Τούρκοι γιόρταζαν τότε τό Ραμαζάνι. Νήστευαν όλη μέρα, τό βράδυτό είχαν ρίξει στό φαγοπότι καί τήν διασκέδασι. Οί περισσότεροι είχαν μαζευτή στά μεγάλα πλοία. Ο Κανάρης κι' ό Πιπίνος έπλησίασαν μέ τά πυρπολικά των τά πλοία, πρώτος ό Πιπίνος άναψε τό δικό του καί τό προσκόλησε στήν Ναυρχίδα, σέ λίγα λεπτά οί φλόγες έζωσαν τήν Ναυαρχίδα,ή φωτιά μετεδόθηκε καί σέ πλοίο πού ήταν έκεί κοντά άγκυροβολημένο, ύστερα σέ άλλα πλοία, οί Τούρκοι δέν ήξεραν τί συμβαίνει. Έπεφταν στήν θάλασσα καί προσπαθούσαν νά φύγουν άπό τά πλοία πού δέν είχαν πιά φωτιά.

Σέ λίγο ή φωτιά έφθασε στήν πυριτιδαποθήκη. Η Ναυαρχίδα σάν πυροτέχνιμα άνατινάχτηκε στό άγέρα μέ ένα τρομαχτικό κρότο. Ο Κανάρης άπό μακρυά άκουσε τόν κρότο καί είδε τίς φλόγες καί είπε [Ω τί ώραία φωτοχυσία] έτσι ό Κανάρης έκδικήθηκε τήν καταστροφή τής Χίου. Οί Τούρκοι έχασαν 2000 Ναύτες καί πολλά πλοία, τά ύπόλοιπα έφυγαν γιά τόν Ελλήσποντο, καί γιά πολύν καιρό δέν τολμούσαν νά βγούν στό Αίγαιο, φοβόντουσαν τά πυρπολικά...

Stewardship 2007 Update | Michael Kritiotis

Dear Holy Trinity Stewards,

s the 2008 stewardship drive continues successfully thus far through its early months, the 2007 final results have been tallied and showed that the Holy Trinity stewards made strides in responding to the call to improve our pledge levels to a meaningful level so that we can help our Church achieve its mission.

The Good News: Growth

Below you see various charts and statistics from 2007 and

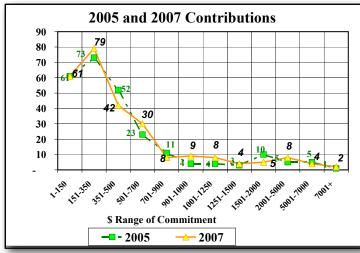
prior Stewardship years. We have been experiencing minor growth in number of pledges, reaching 260 for the first time in 2007. More importantly, commitments



on average and in total have also grown, resulting in over \$170,000 contributed last year.

The Continuing Challenge

With this good news, we must also be mindful that we have a long way to go before we can proudly say that our stewardship covers our Church's routine bills. To be exact, our stewardship offsets less than 60% of the day-to-day expenses. The reason our progress is slow can be found in the last graph. It shows that, in comparison to 2005, very little progress has



been made in 2007 to "move" large numbers of members from the left edge to the center of the graph – or, from the lowest range of giving toward the center. You'll notice that a high number of us (70%, actually) still contribute less than \$500 per year. And, more than half of the parishioners give less than \$350 annually (these are actual dollars given, not merely pledges).

The Dangers

Even though there are certain cases where this is justifiable as a fair share, most are able to do more. When we hold back and give less to the Church than we would for a few nights out or what we perhaps spend on tips to servers or on a shopping trip, we put several of our Church programs at risk and add to the burden of the few who are willing to make an all-out effort and support the ministries that all of us have available, the Community and the Church that is here for our salvation. Let us please make a conscious effort to see that this trend ends today.

The Needs

Over the past few years, we used the example of the church needing \$850 per day to keep its doors open. If you are giving less than that and you know that you are able to increase your pledge, consider sponsoring the church for a day! Consider changing your pledge so that we can achieve the goal of putting aside money earned from the festival and other events for the future of the church and not into paying today's bills. What a rewarding experience that would be! Ones who are giving at higher levels also know that it is possible to do better. As St. Paul said, each to our ability and based on what was given to us. Please take a personal and spiritual inventory to follow and renew this discipleship of true giving for what is the center of our Christian lives.

The Timing

Another way to help with the church budget is to avoid waiting until the end of the year to make your stewardship donations. The Church's expenses are highest in the first six months of the year and can't always wait to be paid later. Therefore, every year, money needs to be taken from the savings account to make up the difference. If at all possible, please make every effort to pay a large part of your 2008 pledge by this Spring.

Please understand that these remarks were not meant to discourage you, offend or worse, distance you. But there is so much that we are still called to do, and only together we'll succeed. "Together" means each and every one of us; and that includes you.

Opening During Remodeling! | Lenten Lessons

Throughout the history of the Church, teachers, hierarchs and spiritual guides have drawn many analogies to help us understand the role of Lent, fasting, prayer and spiritual growth in the lives of Orthodox Christians. Each has its own merits and is helpful in our life in Christ. The following article was published in "Life Transfigured," a journal from Holy Transfiguration Orthodox Monastery in Ellwood City, PA. In addition to the many helpful, daily examples it presents, this spiritual guidance also leads us into Lent with an understanding that we are not heading toward a moment of perfection or achievement, but rather a season and a lifetime of our soul as a "work in progress." So do not be despondent when your spiritual work is not complete on any given day. Press on. Remember, you are "open during remodeling!"

The House of God

Your house is that in which you live and move and have your being. Within it dwells your body, heart and God. This

little temple of the wood of the tree needs a strong foundation deeply secured on the rock nestled against the side of the hill from whence cometh Thy help, the One Who made heaven and earth.

Walls

Your house needs walls to hold up the roof, so that the sun will not smite thee by day nor the moon by night; so that the Psalmist's lone bird on the roof-top will have a place to rest his foot: so that it can serve as Moses' veil worn over his shining face (having received the Ten Commandments), when your life within becomes so radiant the neighbors would think your house afire!

Lights

Your house needs lamps, chandeliers, lampadas in front of the icons. for you see by the light of your eye and by God Who is Light and in Whom there is no darkness at all.

Rooms

Your house needs rooms for your family members, for in your Father's House there are many mansions. And for the One for Whom there was no room in the inn

HOW TO FAST DURING LENT AND HOLY WEEK

(Note: All the dates below refer to 2008 specifically. These change eash year due to the varying date of Pascha, April 27 this year.)

Fast Free Pre-Lenten Week: (Feb. 17-23)

The week of the Publican and the Pharisee—which is the beginning of the Triodion Period—is a fast-free week, which means no fasting the entire week (even Wednesday and Friday of this week are fast-free).

Meatfare Week (Feb. 24-Mar. 1)

Meat Fare Week is the week that follows the Sunday of the Prodigal Son. During this week, the normal Wednesday/Friday fast prevails on these two days. All other foods are permitted the other days of this week.

Cheesefare Week (Mar. 2-Mar. 8)

Cheese Fare Week is the week that follows Meat Fare Sunday. During this week, there is abstinence of meat and meat byproducts the entire week, but dairy products (milk, eggs, cheese, etc.), fish, olive oil and wine are allowed the entire week (up until sundown of Cheesefare Sunday, March 9).

Great Lent and Holy Week (Mar. 10-Apr. 26)

Weekdays: During this time, the Holy Canons indicate abstinence of meat, meat byproducts, dairy products, fish, olive oil and wine. There are two exceptions to the above: Fish is allowed on March 25 and on Palm Sunday (April 20 this year) due to the celebratory nature of those great feasts.

Saturdays and Sundays: During Great Lent, olive oil and wine are permitted (Except on Holy Saturday - a strict fast is kept on this day.)

All Days: Shellfish (shrimp, crab, scallops, etc), fruits and vegetables, grains, etc., are permitted throughout this period on all days.

General Notes

As with all rules of fasting, which are designated by the Holy Canons of the Orthodox Church, you are instructed to seek counsel from your Spiritual Father/ Parish Priest for your personal guidance on fasting. Fasting is not effective or even spritual if it is an empty physical exercise; it must be accompanied by prayer, almsgiving, reading of Holy Scripture and other related books and attendance at church services. We should strive to attend as many Lenten Services as possible. It is also recommended that you participate in the Sacrament of Confession at the onset and/or during this period of Great and Holy Lent. Any questions should be directed to your Spiritual Father/Parish Priest. Remember, true fasting is not meant to be a set of rules making for a dismal life; rather, it frees us from the slavery of sin since the fast from certain foods & their quantity harmonizes with spiritual fasting - a fasting from sin and passions. We should also remember that it is as important to fast with what comes out of our mouth as well as what goes into it. God does not need our fasting and we do not "earn" blessings or any other other gift of God by fasting; rather, it expresses our desire for a more pure state of communion with Him.

From Hymns of the Church

"Let us begin the fast with joy. Let us give ourselves to spiritual efforts. Let us cleanse our souls. Let us cleanse our flesh. Let us fast from passions as we fast from foods, taking pleasure in the good works of the Spirit and accomplishing in them love ."

(Forgiveness Sunday Vespers)



TIPS ON MAINTAINING A HEALTHY LENTEN FAST

- 1) Reduce all "empty calorie" foods (i.e., cookies, cakes, candy, soda/pop, etc.) and replace them with nutrient-dense foods, such as whole grains, legumes [Legumes include: chickpeas, beans (black, red and navy), lentils, peanuts, peas, soy and bean sprouts], nuts, seeds, fruits and vegetables.
- 2) Use a variety of fruits and vegetables in meals. Add a vitamin C source to each meal. Vitamin C is highest in fruits and fruit juices, but is also plentiful in red sweet peppers, kohlrabi, broccoli, pod peas, sweet potatoes, cauliflower and kale, just to
- 3) Provide vitamin D by daily exposure to the sun or by foods fortified with vitamin D (for example, certain breakfast cereals and milk alternatives).

HOW TO EAT APPROPRIATELY ALL YEAR ROUND!

Even when we are not fasting, what and how we eat still provides an opportunity to live and express our Orthodox Faith and piety.

How Should We Conduct Ourselves During Meals?

The following spiritual guidance has been excerpted from Chapter 6 of "How to Live a Holy Life," by Metropolitan Gregory of St. Petersburg (1784-1860), published by Holy Trinity Monastery in Jordanville, NY. It is provided here as a balance to the article on fasting on the previous page and for helpful instructions to make sure we are both thankful and appropriate whether or not we are fasting on any given day.

Prayer

Never begin lunch or dinner, or finish them, without fervent prayer to the Lord God as, unfortunately, very many Christians of our time do. One cannot but marvel at how these Christians have reached such a condition of soul that they can both

start a meal and finish it without a fervent prayer to the Lord God. For it is precisely the Lord God Who supplies us with all our food. Granted, we ourselves also worked to obtain our food, but what would all our work amount to if the Lord God did not give us His blessing—if, for example, He did not bestow the proper warmth, moisture, wind and sun on the fields and gardens that we have cultivated and sown? Absolutely nothing, as, of course, everyone

ately or to excess. Our food is a gift from God, and all gifts of God, being divine, should be received reverently, decorously, with the fear of God, and consumed only for the purpose for which they are given. Our food is given to us for not for satiety, but for satisfaction. Satiety is extremely harmful for our body, because stomach disorder, corruption of the blood, various diseases of the body, and premature death are in great part a result of excess or intemperance. Doctors, experience, and the Spirit of God attest to this. For excess of meats bringeth sickness. . . by surfeiting have many perished, says the Wise One (Eccles 37:33,34).

At the Table

During lunch and dinner never say anything sinful. Because

to insult God at the same time as vou are eating His gifts, when it is especially necessary to feel and show gratitude to God, is the vilest ingratitude. But unfortunately, during lunch and dinner many carry on the most impious conversations: they condemn. defame. mock each other, especially absent neighbors, tell suggestive jokes, give themselves up to ludicrous behavior, speak disrespectfully of the faith, of various sacred subjects relating

to the faith, and so on. Such conduct over lunch and dinner is extreme ingratitude to the Lord God. Guard against it in every way possible.

Moderation

Our meals should always be moderate. All the saints, who customarily watched strictly after themselves, say with one voice: 1) that very little is needed for satisfaction of our bodies; 2) that our bellies by themselves almost never know moderation; 3) that our bellies sometimes demand food even when they have had more than enough, and 4) that therefore to maintain moderation it is best to cease consumption of food when the urge to eat has still not completely subsided. St. John Chrysostom gave an excellent rule for observing necessary moderation in food: "Eat just enough to alleviate your hunger." Another holy teacher said "You should not eat whatever you want, but eat what you have, and in a way that after eating and drinking, you still feel an urge for food."

At meals, especially dinner, never consume food immoder-

Our Daily Bread

Whoever consumes his lunch and dinner thus, that is, moderately and with gratitude to the Lord God, is acting as duty demands, in a righteous and God-pleasing manner. Perhaps in his home there will not be abundance, but at the same time there will never be complete poverty. The Holy Prophet David says, I have been young, and now am old; yet have I not seen the righteous forsaken, nor his seed begging bread. On the contrary, the righteous man often finds himself even in such a position that He is ever merciful, and lendeth (Ps. 37:25,26), that is, every day he sustains the poor and provides them with something. And so, whoever does not have his daily bread should examine himself attentively and dispassionately to determine whether he prays for his daily bread to the Lord God before his lunch and dinner and whether he labors for his daily bread.

The History of Philoptochos (...continued from www.Philoptochos.org)

Spyros Skouras of Twentieth Century Fox spearheaded the activity of the Greek War Relief. He arranged for a premiere benefit of the famous film, "Gone With the Wind" with the ladies engaged in the myriad of details for this event; a special "Tag Day" was initiated by the Philoptochos throughout the U.S. with the ladies soliciting contributions on street corners, restaurants, super markets and other business establishments, including the neighborhood theatres; many events and programs were organized with proceeds sent to the Greek War Relief; and "knit a sweater for a soldier" was a popular project. Sewing Centers were set up with the valuable assistance of the Council of Hellenic-Jewish Clothing Manufacturers which was headed by Joseph Josephs, providing hundreds of articles of clothing for children and adults in Greece. Heading this project was Mrs. Agatha Vernicos of London, as chairman, Mrs. Sophie Hadjiyanis and Mrs. Katy Vlavianos were co-chairmen, and the secretary was Mrs. Despina Vrachopoulos.

The activity of the Greek War Relief continued for several years. With the entry of the U.S. in the war following Pearl Harbor, the Ladies Philoptochos devoted long hours to selling War Bonds, to the American Red Cross under the leadership of Dr. George Papanickolaou, who later developed the famous "Pap" test to detect cancer of the uterus in women, and offering hospitality to soldiers on leave prompting the American Government to praise the efforts of the Philoptochos.

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Why We Venerate Holy Objects and Images



On the first Sunday of Lent, the Orthodoxx Church celebrates the restoration of the holy icons as proclaimed by the Seventh Ecumenical Council (787 A.D.) following the Iconoclastic Controversy, which sought to remove these holy images from the Church. Additionally, this issue of The Herald celebrates the completion of the first icon, the Pantokrator, at the new Saint George Chapel at Holy Trinity Cemetery. In observation of both these events, it is good to refresh our understanding of the holy images and their proper use. This helps us become more enlightened Orthodox Christians in worship and better witnesses for the Faith to others.

If you sincerely love your friend, or your king, or especially your benefactor, if you should see his son or his servant, do you not embrace him, or if you see his staff or his throne, or his crown, or his house, do you not salute them? If you thus honor a benefactor or the emperor, how much greater should be the honor you give to God! Again I say, Would that you had made images according to the law of Moses and the prophets, and each day worshipped the God and Master who commanded them. Therefore when you see Christians bowing down before the cross, know that they bow down to Christ crucified, and not to the wood... [The Cross and the images of the saints] are not our gods, but are like books which lie open in the churches in the sight of all. We venerate them, and thus are reminded of the honor we owe God. He who honors the martyr honors God to whom the martyr bore witness; he who venerates the apostle of Christ worships Him who sent the apostle. He who falls at the feet of Christ's mother most certainly gives honor to her Son. There is no God but one: He who is known and adored in Trinity.
