

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Christos Anesti! Christ is Risen!

I recently travelled to Denver for Archdiocese Presbyters Council meetings and was reminded of the early days of the western settlers and the early land rush, when pioneers were allowed to claim whatever land they could stake off in a day. With real estate being considerable more expensive these days, it seems like an unimagineable opportunity. Talk about God providing ... free land!

Yet He still continues to do so in many ways, recognized and hidden, as Saint Paul promises in the above passage from 2 Corinthians. But notice that, just as the settlers had to work even for their "free" land by rushing out and staking the land, so we also must still put our sincere effots into seeing, appreciating and using His blessings for the purpose He intends.

I am so deeply thankful as the priest and spiritual father of this community for the many ways so many members of our Holy Trinity family do just that. On any given day, there are people volunteering, cooking, doing accounting, cleaning, teaching, working and helping in any way the Church needs. It reminds us that sometimes, as we look around and wonder where the help will come from, we are the blessing that God has provided to meet the needs of His Holy Church! This happens because, according to Christian researcher George Barna, "He endowed us with brains, language, energy and many other resources so that we can apply ourselves to the challenges of ministry and—with His guidance and blessing—see His will and His people prevail" (Habits of Highly Effective Churches, p187).

A great example of who fruitful those labors of love can be came during Lent at Holy Trinity this year. At the beginning of Lent, after all the schedules has been published, our church furnace went out. The weather was bitter cold. We met in the hall on Sunday. But the heat had to be complete shut down for pipe and furnace work during the weekdays. Because of the love and dedication of this community to honor its founders and departed members, the Saint George Chapel, which was built as an offering of love only three years agao, was there for us to hold our Lenten services. And the furnace work, through countless hours of work and some very good resources provided by parishioners, turned out to be much more effective and less expensive than we thought, and that work will be a huge blessing when it comes to selling this building when we move to the new property.

How did that all happen? Because God provided and faithful people stepped up! So when you are asked to cook, clean, serve on a committe or ministry or volunteer in any other way, remember, it is not a burden, it is a part of the blessing that God has provided for you, your family and your community. From festivals to mission trips, from repairs on this church to building a new one, He will provide, but we must respond.

He has given us the victory of the Resurrection: let us use that new life for His glory! Christ is risen!

Christ Lives!

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

Christ is risen! Truly He is risen! The angel spoke to the women. "You must not be afraid," he said. "I know you are looking for Jesus, who was nailed to the Cross. He is not here; He has risen, just as He said. Come here and see the place where He lay." (Matthew 28: 5, 6)

Christ lives!

He is not dead. He is alive—still with us. We are told that the early Christians greeted each other with, "He lives." In our Orthodox Christian Churches we shout with joy, "Christ is risen!" "Truly He is risen!" We believe Christ lives, that He is Master of life, Conqueror of death, Victor for all times.

We are glad that the women found that tomb empty. You go to Mecca and they say, "Mohammed is our prophet and here is his grave." And, they show you a tomb decorated with millions of dollars worth of rubies and sapphires and diamonds. But, the Christian can shout, "Jesus is my Savior, and His tomb is empty! He is not a dead Savior—He is alive!"

Would that all of us this might lift this affirmation to one another this Pascha/Easter: "Christ is alive!" Pascha means no less than this—and it can mean more as we die to self and live for Him.

"The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23)

PASCHA—EASTER! Immediately we associate this Holy Season with the Resurrection of our Lord. Then with the Resurrection we immediately think of immortality. We do not have to wonder about nor speculate about eternal life, for Jesus assured us of its certainty when He said, "In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you."

When Jesus was comforting Martha after the death of her brother Lazarus, we hear Him saying, "He who believes in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die." Now Christ's Resurrection guarantees ours. Most conclusive of all

His promises is this one. He said, "Because I live, you shall live also." He is called "the first fruits of them that sleep." You go to a tree filled with fruit. You pick the first ripe fruit, then later you go back and pick the remaining fruit as it ripens. So, Jesus was raised first. He is the "first fruits." Then one day we shall follow Him out of our graves and into the mansions above.

THE GOOD NEWS OF EASTER

"Because I live, you shall live also." (John 14: 19)

The Scriptures tell us that Jesus Christ lived and went about doing good, healing the lame, giving sight to the blind, comforting the broken-hearted, freeing men from

their sins. They tell us that He was cru-

cified and arose again on the third day. They tell us that He is alive now, moving in our midst, sharing life with us, offering us new life, trying to get us to give our sinful hearts to Him, to free us from all that would keep us from being our best.

He is here in the world trying to let us know that His victory over death means that we too can be victors in His name, that at the heart of life is a loving and caring God, and that we need not be afraid of life and the future. He is here and wants us to know that our real hope lies not in the relics we all leave, not in the honors which come our way, not in the status we may reach, not in the degrees we may hold, not in the bank balances we may leave nor

the stocks and bonds we may pass on to

those left behind; but that our real hope lies in God as we know Him in Christ, and to know Him is to have eternal life.

PASCHA! Day of hope, Day of Promise, Day of Joy! No wonder we sing on PASCHA, "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and upon those in the tombs bestowing life."

We should thank God for knowing our lives have been resurrected through His saving power. May we trust Him more completely, serve Him more faithfully and love Him more dearly. On Pascha, let us dedicate our lives to the Risen Lord.

May the Risen Lord, the King of Kings on this most radiant Feast of Pascha fill our hearts with Joy and grant Fr. John, the parish priest, and his family and everyone in our family at Holy Trinity Church, good health and many, many years without pain and suffering and sickness.

What Is A Mother?

The History of Philoptochos (...continued from www.Philoptochos.org)

In November, 1948, Archbishop Athenagoras was elected to the highest ecclesiastical office of the Orthodox Church: Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople. He departed for his historic See in January, 1949. During the years that followed Patriarch Athenagoras I bestowed the highest honors of his Ecumenical Throne on several dedicated Philoptochos Ladies by granting them the title of "Archontissa".

During the first twenty years of its existence the Philoptochos Society's major accomplishments were recorded, among which were the Church's most important institutions: the Holy Cross Theological School (which moved to Brookline, Mass.), and St. Basil Academy.

Archbishop Michael was elected Primate of the Greek Orthodox Church in the Americas in 1949. Under his spiritual guidance, the Philoptochos continued its mission of humanitarian services. They assisted the Archbishop in establishing the Greek Orthodox Youth of America, and participated in an arduous campaign, launched by the Archbishop, to have the U.S. Government place the initials, G.O. on dog tags to accurately identify Greek Orthodox members of the Armed Forces. This was a remarkable accomplishment by the Greek Orthodox community.

Archbishop Michael, in 1951, placed the administration, budget and supervision of St. Basil Academy under the Archdiocese. Since its establishment, the Philoptochos had been totally responsible for its operation. The Society continues to this day its dedicated support of the institution.

A devastating earthquake shook the Ionian Islands in 1953 and once again the Philoptochos chapters rallies its forces to offer considerable assistance, sending food, clothing, medicine and financial support to the beleaguered people of the Ionian Islands.

A new plateau was reached in 1956, when the Philoptochos National Conference, for the first time, was convened simultaneously with the Archdiocesan Clergy-Laity Congress in Washington, D.C. At this Conference the Philoptochos was urged to participate in local chapters of the United Council of Church Women.

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
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On God and Love

In His self-revelation to us in the world and in life. The summit and the fulfillment of this self-revelation is Christ. Everything relates to Him. The Incarnation, the entrance into the world of nature, of time, of history is for Him. It follows that love for God is Christ. Joy in Him. Love for Him. The reference of everything to Him. The gathering of everything in Him. Life in Him, by the knowledge of Him in everything through the Holy Spirit. The Church: the possibility and the gift of this love and life. Amen.
