



God is Love

The following are some verses from the first Epistle of John, Chapter 4:

My beloved! Let us love one another, for love comes from God. Whoever loves is a child of God and knows God. Whoever does not love. does not know God. because God is love. This is how God showed His love for us: He sent His only Son into the world that we might have life through Him. This is what love is: it is not that we have

loved God. but that He loved

us and sent His son to be the means by which our sins are forgiven.

My beloved! If this is how God loved us. then we should love one another. No one has ever seen God: if we love one another. God lives in us and His love is made perfect within us. (1 John 4:7-12) God is Love, and whoever lives in love lives in God. and God lives in him (1 John4: 16).

"He Showed How Perfect His Love Was."

Washing the feet of guests was a duty of household slaves; a towel wrapped around the waist was distinctive garb for them. Hence Peter resisted Jesus washing his feet, because by doing so, Jesus took on Himself the role of a common servant. Peter was horrified at the idea of Jesus performing such a lowly task.


lesus not only performed this lowly service, but He

told his disciples that He did it as an example for them. And then He gave them His new and distinctive commandment: they were to love each other as He had loved them. What was new about the new commandment was that the love that Jesus had demonstrated was not to be the standard. No longer was it adequate to love others as we love ourselves; now we must love others as Christ loved us.

The love of Christ goes beyond self-love, since it is a love that undertakes lowly service. Indeed the love that Christ had for us was a love to the point of laying down His life for us. Jesus fully knew that He was giving the new commandment of love on the eve of His death, and he knew that was to be the ultimate demonstration of the meaning of his new commandment. The new commandment means that the love that God has shown us is to be the way that we love others.

This Is How We Know What Love Is

Christ gave His life for us. We, too, then ought to give our lives for our brothers. If a man is rich and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against his brother, how can he claim that he has love for God in his heart? My children! Our love should not be just words and talk; it must be true love



which shows itself in action. (1 John 3:16-18)

John reminds his readers that they are children of God and need to live as God's children. To live as children of God requires that we break with sin and obey instead the new commandment of love. It is not enough to take refuge in the fact that God loves us; He also has His requirements for us. John warns against our being led astray into believing that our continuing in sin is somehow oaky. God will accept our repentance, no matter how great our sin, but to deliberately harbor sin in our life is to reject His love.

The love that lesus had for us is to be the model for our love of others. If we do so, then we can have a peaceful conscience, knowing that God has indeed made a difference in our lives, knowing that He is indeed present in us through His Sprit.

God Is Spirit—God Is Love—God Is With Us

Food for thought: This is from the reading of the Gospel of the first Sunday of October: "That which you hate, do not do it to others."

Hello, my precious children!



Speaking of snow, that reminds me of a great book



Community Life Photo Journal | Historic Special General Assembly

September 11, 2011: In another of a series of historic Special General Assembly meetings, members of Holy Trinity Church gathered to find out the latest information on the new church project. Pictured here are scenes from the meeting, presentations and voting. Three key decisions were presented by the Vision Committee as follows:

Motion #1 - PASSED 87% YES

"The General Assembly accepts the Vision Committee and Parish Council recommendations and approves the sale of approximately 5.98 acres on Ringeisen Road (Holy Trinity Cemetery) to the Herbert Family Partnership for \$255,000. The General Assembly further authorizes the Officers of the Church and the Parish Council to undertake all appropriate and necessary actions and undertakings to consummate and complete such sale."

Motion #2 - PASSED 93% YES

"The General Assembly accepts the Vision Committee and Parish Council recommendations and approves the land development and construction of a Church, hall, administrative and educational facilities at a cost not to exceed \$6.5 million on the 10 acres of property owned by Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church at the corner of Cumberland Road and Babcock Boulevard in the Town of McCandless. The General Assembly further authorizes the Officers of the Church and the Parish Council to undertake all appropriate and necessary actions and undertakings and to enter into the necessary contracts to begin and complete such construction."

Motion #3 - PASSED 93% YES

"The General Assembly accepts the Vision Committee and Parish Council recommendations and approves arranging financing for short term borrowing not to exceed \$2.7 million to be replaced after construction by long term financing not to exceed \$1.7 million to support the land development and construction of a Church, hall, administrative and educational facilities on the 10 acres of property owned by Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church at the corner of Cumberland Road and Babcock Boulevard in the Town of McCandless. The General Assembly further authorizes the Officers of the Church and the Parish Council to undertake all appropriate and necessary actions and undertakings and to enter into the necessary contracts to complete such transactions."

As a result of this vote, the Parish Council was authorized to proceed with the contracts and financing needed to start the project. Ground breaking is being planned for November. **To God be the Glory!**

Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church Expects to Break Ground in North Hills in October

A new Byzantine-style church will be built on 10 acres at Cumberland Road and Babcock Boulevard. The church purchased the property from La Roche College. In the meantime, services are being held in the former Northway Elementary School.

August 28, 2011: Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church, formerly of Pittsburgh's North Side, has set up temporary residence at the former Northway Elementary School, 495 Browns Lane, in Ross Township as it finalizes plans and works toward the construction of its new church at the corner of Cumberland Road and Babcock Boulevard.

Groundbreaking on the Byzantine-style building is planned for October, with construction expected to take 14 to 15 months, said the Rev. John Touloumes.

"We hope to be in the new church by January 2013," he said.



Founded in 1923, Holy Trinity Church is a parish of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Pittsburgh and Archdiocese of America. It has a congregation of about 250 families with a membership of 1,000, Touloumes said.

The church had been in its North Side location since

1923. The congregation's migration sparked the move to the North Hills, he said.

"Most of our congregation left the North Side and has moved to the North Hills," he said. "We followed our congregation out of the North Side."

The 10-acre location at Cumberland Road and Babcock Boulevard, which was purchased from La Roche College, is the church's "demographic center," Touloumes said.

The former property was sold to the Northside Institutional Church of God in Christ, whose church was lost to a fire in 2009.



Christ Kamages, a San Francisco-based architect known for his focus on faith-based structures, in particular, the merging of the style of Byzantine cathedrals with modern needs, designed the new church.

Besides the church, there will be a community center and educational facilities, Touloumes said.


Until the project is completed, the congregation is renting the temporary location from the North Hills School District. Services are being conducted in the school's auditorium and gymnasium. The site has been supplemented with chairs for the congregation and a temporary altar, including liturgical items brought from the North Side location.

School offices are being used for church administration and the classrooms for storage and teachings.

Divine Liturgy is at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday.

Elder Thaddeus: Our Thoughts Determine Our Lives | Ask the Elders

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many book have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to blessed by their words. This month we begin a series excerpted from the book, "Our Thoughts Determine Our Lives" by Elder Thaddeus

 \mathcal{N}^{e} are like a fine thought-appa- \mathcal{V} ratus. We are connected to each other by our thoughts. When we think of a person, he immediately receives our thoughts. But since we are distracted, and our thoughts are scattered, we cannot discern who it is that is send-

That our thoughts connect us to one

ing us thoughts, or the kind of thoughts he is sending us. On the other hand, the person who has peaceful thoughts, who is united with the Lord and whom the Lord has freed from distractions, this person knows exactly: which thoughts are his own; which ones come from the enemy; and which ones are from friends. Feelings and thoughts coming from the minds of our fellowmen reach us. This is why I say to you that when we forgive from the heart, our neighbor can feel this; and the burden that has been oppressing his soul is no more.

That the meek and humble of heart overcome the "net of thoughts"

Thoughts are planted in our minds at all times --- from all sides and directions. Were it given us to see the radii of thoughts, we would see a real net of thoughts. Everyone has a receiver in his mind, one that is much more precise and sophisticated than a radio or television set. How wonderful is the mind of man! Unfortunately, we do not appreciate this. We do not know how to unite ourselves with the Source of life, and to feel joy. The adversary is always planting seeds in our minds. St Anthony was permitted to see the net of thoughts around him; and when he saw them, he exclaimed, 'Lord, who can be saved?' And he heard a voice saying, 'Only those who are meek and humble of heart.' The evil spirits cannot touch those who are meek and humble of heart, for they are united with peace and silence. They have no negative thoughts.

That we must avoid making hasty decisions, especially in dealings with our neighbor.

We must truly try to do everything as our conscience tells us, but we must not do anything in haste. It is when we are in a hurry that the enemy traps us. In haste, we cannot be aware of whether we have said something to offend our fellow man; or whether we have ignored him, because we have no time to think of him. We are too busy with the plans inside our head. In this manner, it is easy to sin against our neighbor. And when we sin against our neighbor, we actually sin against God; for He is everywhere. Our relationship toward our fellow men defines our relationship toward God.

On the struggle between good and evil.

There is a constant war between good and evil. We wish to be good, but the spirite of wished be good, but the spirits of wickedness do not want us to have a single good character trait—only bad ones. This is why we must fight. We cannot fight on our own, but the Lord is our Protector; for as soon as we ask Him sincerely to help us, He will immediately come to our aid.

On the fear of God

The fear of God is when you love Him, when you truly love him with all your heart and strive never to offend or sadden Him—not only with your deeds, actions and words, but also with your thoughts. You try to please Him in everything you do or say. That is the fear of God: the fear of doing anything that might sadden or offend our Parent.

On preparing to receive Holy Communion

 γ he Holy Orthodox Church has determined the rules of preparation for Holy Communion. The main thing is to prepare the heart for uniting with the Lord. Fasting is necessary for calming the body; and once the body is at peace, the soul is also at peace. Therefore, we are to prepare out hearts in humility and meekness for communing with the Lord.

The Church teaches us how to fast. First, we must all make peace with our neighbor. Every parish priest must all make peace with his [parishioners]. Knowing that we are all children of God, How can we benefit from Holy Communion, if we cannot stand a certain person? If we receive Holy Communion in such a state of mind, it will not be unto our salvation; for we have not rid ourselves of this feeling from Hades.

The Lord is all love, peace and joy. For this, we must prepare our hearts. If we prepare our hearts to be humble and meek, full of love, then we will enjoy the health of both body and soul. If there is none of that in us, then we will be receiving Holy Communion unto our judgment and not our salvation. That is why we always pray, "O Lord, let this Holy Communion be unto my salvation and not unto my judgment or condemnation."

Fasting is the preparation of a humble heart. The Holy Fathers say, 'He who has no obedience, fasts and prays to God in vain. Obedience is greater than either fasting or prayer.' When I was younger, I did not guite understand this teaching of the Holy Fathers. Later, I learned why this was so. The man who does not humble himself and does not cleanse his heart from evil desires fasts in vain. He may eat nothing at all, but it will be to no avail if evil is inside him. In order to receive the Lord, he must first cleanse himself from the evil within.

That nothing happens in the universe unbeknown to God!

 ${\cal N}$ othing happens—either in the world or the universe— without the will of God, or His permission. All that is good and noble is God's will, and all that is negative and bad happens because He allows it. He knows why He allows these things to happen and for how long. If the incorporeal angelic powers - or we men - were allowed to do as we please, there would be total chaos in the world and in the entire universe. But God is present everywhere, and He is Light—a Light that penetrates all.

γερμού στά καταφύγια. Ή νεότητα κάλυπτη, τραγουδώντας στούς δρόμους θούρια παίζοντας θά έλεγε κανείς μέ τόν κίνδυνο καί τόν θάνατο, παρακολουθούσε ζητωκραυγάζονταςτάντιαεροπορικά πυρά έναντίον τών έχθρικών άεροπλάνων.

Κάποια στιγμή, διηγείται ό Σπύρος Μελάς, ένας νέος μέ πλησιάζει μέ άγκαλιάζει συγκινημένος Εχε γειά φεύγω, Κάλεσαν τήν ήλικία σου? Οχι, έχω άπαλαγεί, άλλά πάω έθελοντής. Ζήτω ή Ελλάς...

Καί δέν ήταν ό μόνος ήταν όλοι. Νέοι ήλικιωμένοι, άνδρες, γυναίκες, παιδιά, ξύπνησε μέσα τους ίστορία τριών χιλιάδων χρόνων.



Γι΄αύτό στό μέτωπο οί νίκες διαδέχονταν ή μιά τήν άλλη, ό κόσμος έτριβε τά μάτια του.

Γιατί έβλεπαν ότι άπό τήν Έλλάδα προβαλλόταν ή μόνη άντίσταση. Έβλεπαν ότι αύτοί πού διέθεταν λίγο καί όχι άξιόμαχο όπλισμό άπεκρουσαν τούς πανίσχυρους Ίταλούς τούς καταδίωξαν μέχρι τήν Κλεισούρα,πέρα άπό τό Άργυρόκαστρο. Οί άπίθανες Έλληνικές νίκες άναπτέρωσαν τό ήθικό τών λαών τής Εύρώπης.

Οί Σύμμαχοι, χάρη στόν άγώνα τής μικρής Έλλάδος κέρδισαν τόν πόλεμο.

Οί Έλληνες ποτέ δέν πρέπει νά τό ξεχνούμε. Εστω κι άν οί τότε σύμμαχοι καί ύμνητές μας έπαθαν όλική άμνησία. Τούς συμφέρει. Γιατί άν θελήσουν νά θυμηθούν, πρέπει νά σκύψουν τό κεφάλι άπό ντροπή. Καί νά όμολογήσουν ότι ή νεότερη Εύρώπη όφείλει τήν έλευθερία, τήν τιμή, καί τήν ήθική άξιοπρέπεια τών άνθρώπων στήν Ελλάδα.

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
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
