

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Christ,

his column is usually reserved for a community message relating to the current season or issues relevant to the life of the community. I add personal elements from time to time through a desire to share meaninful or inspirational experiences of my own that may also inspire or bless you through reading about them. This month, please allow me to focus on this holy season of the Theotokos by sharing comments on two special blessings I received at her hands. It is my way of being part of every generation calling her "blessed" (Luke 1.48).

The Theotokos has brought me many blessings, both as a member of the Body of Christ and as an ordained priest at His Holy Altar. As an unmarried and un-ordained seminary graduate back in 1987, not knowing where my life was going or what to even look for, I remember visiting the miraculous weeping icon of the Theotokos at St. Nicholas Albanian Orthodox Church in Chicago and being told by a wise spiritual guide, "take your prayers before the Theotokos and ask her. She will guide you through her prayers and reveal God's will to you." Kneeling in front of that weeping icon, my world quaked, she affirmed the truth of those words, and she continues to do so to this day. I was suddenly at peace, for I knew I that promise was true and that I would find the answer I was told I would find. Not long afterwards, I met Presvytera Becky at a Young Adult League conference in Saint Louis. We were married a year later and this past June we celebrated our 24th wedding anniversary. For all those years and the many blessings the Theotokos continues to bring into our lives, I am eternally grateful for the Panagia's prayers, maternal blessings and love, including three blessed and wonderful children, the last of whom enters college this year. That is the personal side of this "thank you note."

Now, on to the ministry side of that note. As we enter this holy season of the Falling Asleep of the Theotokos (August 1-15), I am reminded of yet another life-changing revelation and blessing for which I must thank the Panagia: on August 1, 1993, our beloved retired hierarch, Metropolitan Maximos, assigned me as the priest of Holy Trinity Church, located at that time on Pittsburgh's North Side. At that time, Gherontissa Taxiarchia of blessed memory of the Nativity of the Theotokos Monastery in Saxonburg prophesied that the Theotokos would bring many blessings to this ministry. As we cross the threshold together into the 20th year of that ministry on August 1, 2012—myself as priest, Presvytera Becky as, well, Presvytera, and all of you as the members of this most blessed family in Christ—I must affirm Gherontissa's words as I do each year at this time: I have witnessed and experienced countless times in the past 19 years the love, care, blessings and even miracles that the Mother of God continues to bring this community. How appropriate it is in reflection of that truth that the church building in our new church project will be enclosed with walls and a roof during the month of August, as if being wrapped in the arms and veil of the Theotokos. Please join me at the Paraclesis services in thanking her and receiving her blessings as we experience our own "Protection of the Theotokos" icon at work on our very own property!

AUGUST 2012 – THE VOICE OF THE GOSPEL

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ: Rejoice in the Lord Always! August is the month of the All Holy Panagia.

The Feast Days of August

During the month of August, our one, holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church celebrates three great feast days. During the past 11 years, I have written many articles on these three Holy days:

- 1. August 6th The Holy Transfiguration of our Lord
- 2. August 15th The Dormition of the Theotokos
- 3. August 29th The Beheading of John the Baptist

In the last issue of the Herald (June and July), my message was about the Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. My message this month will be a continuation of the Holy Spirit.

Invocation: "Comforter, Spirit of Truth"

Heavenly King, Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, everywhere present and filling all things, Treasury of blessings and Giver of Life, come and dwell in us, cleanse us of every stain and save our souls, gracious One.

"And I will pray to the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter, that He may abide with You forever." John 14:16. The following is an explanation of the above verse:

Jesus is comforting the apostles for He is leaving them. He said to them, "Do not be sad for this, because I will ask the Father, and he will give you another comforter who will stay with you forever. Until now, I was your protector and comforter on this earth. Now because I am going, I will not be with you bodily. You will have the comfort of the spirit of truth (the Holy Spirit). The Holy Spirit will come to the apostles. Others, Jesus said, cannot see him with their own eyes because he is without body. And you my disciples will know him because He will come to you and will dwell in your souls."

Who is the Holy Spirit? The Holy Spirit is God, the third person of the Holy Trinity. In our creed, we confess that we believe in one God, the Father....and in one Lord, Jesus Christ....and in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of Life. This is something that we will never fully understand: the mystery of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. We worship Him as one God, yet He is three persons.

Beloved, this is a mystery, which is a truth we cannot understand. We must but accept it by faith. An example of this faith is St. Augustine, Bishop of Hippo of North Africa, who could not understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity. He took walks on the seashore to clear his mind from confusion. He saw a little boy opening a hole in the sand and he asked the boy what he was doing. The boy answered, "Do you see the water in the sea? I am going to transfer it into this hole." The Bishop said to him, "This is impossible for you to do it."

The little boy answered, "If it is impossible for me to do it, it is impossible for you to understand the mystery of the Holy Trinity." Beloved, God works in mysterious ways.

The Fruit of the Holy Spirit

The fruit of the Holy Spirit is LOVE, JOY, PEACE, PATIENCE, KINDNESS, GOODNESS, FAITHFULNESS, HUMILITY AND SELF-CONTROL (Galations 5:22-23). Against these, there is no law. The body without the Spirit is dead. The Spirit came at Pentecost (Acts 2:1-13).

Sins Against the Holy Spirit

The New Testament mentions seven sins against the Holy Spirit:

- 1. Lie Not to the Spirit (Acts 5:3). These two members of the Church thought they could get by in spite of lying, but God is a great lie detector.
- 2. Tempt Not the Spirit (Acts 5:9). Ananias and Sapphira were pretenders, holding back the complete price and deceiving other Christians. Do we lie and tempt the Spirit when we pay our tithes? Beloved, to understand the above two verses, read from the Book of Acts (Ananias and Sapphira 5:1-11). Both Ananias and Sapphira (husband and wife) both dropped dead before Peter because they lied to the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Blaspheme Not the Spirit (Mark 3:22-30; Matthew (12:22-30). The scribes and Pharisees knew that Jesus did miracles, but they gave credit to the devil rather than God. "Remember this! Men can be forgiven for all of their sins and all of the evil things they say; no matter how often they say them. But the person who says evil things against the Holy Spirit can never be forgiven, for he has committed an eternal sin. Jesus said this because some had said, "He has an evil spirit in Him" (Mark 3:22-30).
- 4. Scorn Not the Holy Spirit (Hebrews 10:28-31). "Despise" and "spite" mean scorn or insult. After all God has done for us, how can we ignore and scorn Calvary?
- 5. Grieve Not the Holy Spirit (Ephesians 4:30-32). We grieve God or parents when we refuse to obey. We grieve the Spirit of God when we harbor malice and envy, refusing to vield to Him.
- 6. Quench Not the Spirit (1 Thessalonians 5:19). He that knows to do good and does not do it, sins.
- 7. Resist Not the Spirit (Acts 7:51). It is dangerous to resist the Spirit's pleadings. He never leads us into wrongdoing.

Food For Thought

To make a mistake is human; to forgive is divine. This makes us imitators of Christ, who said from the Cross, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do."

Benediction

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God the Father, and the communion of the Holy Spirit, be with all of U.S.

Η Πολιτιστική Πλευρά | The Cultural Side

Reflections in modern Greek on the sinking of the Greek ship "Elli" in the harbor of the Island of Tinos on August 15, 1940, and the wondrous intercessions of the Theotokos during the event. Excerpted from the periodical, "Pros Tin Nikin"

Παράσημο Ανδρείας Στό Πολεμικό «Ελλη»

Αύγουστος καί γυρνάμε 72 χρόνια πίσω, στίς 15 Αύγούστου τού 1940. Η γιορτή τής Παναγίας. Πλήθη προσκυνητών έχουν συγκεντρωθεί στή χάρη της στό νησί τής Τήνου.

Στόν όρμο τού λιμανιού έχει φτάσει τά ξημερώματα άπό τή Μήλο καί τό ίστορικό εύδρομο τού έλληνικού στόλου «Ελλη», σημαιοστολισμένο, μεταφέροντας άγημα τού ναυτικού, γιά ν΄ άποδώσει τιμές στήν Προστάτιδα τού έθνους μας. Εκεί σέ λίγο θά δεχτεί άπρόσμενα τό άνανδρο κτύπημα Ιταλικού ύποβρυχίου.

Ο στόχος ήταν φανερός: νά καμφθεί τό ήθικό τού λαού μας στό πολεμικό κλίμα τής έποχής. Ομως ή ίερόσυλη πράξη θά φέρει τό άντίθετο άποτέλεσμα. Η προσβολή τής Μεγαλόχαρης θά χρωματίσει μέ ίερότητα τόν άγώνα πού άρχίζει πλέον νά προετοιμάζεται καί θά δημιουργήσει «σέ όλη τήν Ελλάδα μιά άπόλυτη ένότητα», όπως τό παραδέχθηκε άργότερα καί ό ίδιος ό Ιταλός πρεσβευτής Γκράτσι.

Εκείνο λοιπόν τό πρωινό, καθώς τό πλήρωμα καταγινόταν μέ τόν εύπρεπισμό τού πλοίου, φάνηκε στόν όρίζοντα μιά ξένης έθνικότητας άεράκατος νά διαγράφει δυό κύκλους πάνω άπό τόν όρμο τής Τήνου κι έπειτα νά έξαφανίζεται βορειοδυτικά. Από τή στιγμή αύτη όλοι βρίσκονταν σ΄ έπιφυλακή καί πλήρη έτοιμότητα γιά άμεση άντίδραση. Οταν όμως ή ώρα κυλούσε χωρίς άλλη ύποπτη ένδειξη, καί πάλι οί προετοιμασίες γιά τήν άπόδοση τιμών συνεχίστηκαν μέ τήν ίδια σπουδή.

Μά, ούτε δυό ώρες δέν είχαν περάσει άπό τήν προκλητική παραβίαση καί τό άπρόσμενο έγινε. Ένας τρομαχτικός κρότος συγκλόνισε τό πλοίο άκριβώς στίς 8.25΄. Από τήν τρομερή ταλάντευση όλοι άνατράπηκαν. Αλλοι άνδρες τού πληρώματος έπεσαν κάτω, κάποιοι τραυματισμένοι. Αλλοι βρέθηκαν νά κολυμπούν στή θάλασσα γύρω άπό τό πλοίο. Τό κατάστρωμα είχε γεμίσε μέ νερά καί πετρέλαια, ένώ σέ διάφορα σημεία τού καραβιού είχαν δημιουργηθεί ρήγματα. Οί τρείς διαδοχικές έκρήξεις άπό τίς τορπίλλες, πού κτύπησαν τό πλοίο στά ύφαλά του, άφησαν τραγικό τόν άπολογισμό, μέ πιό όδυνηγή συνέπεια, τά θύματα, τούς ήρωες τού καθήκοντος, πού είτε τραυματίστηκαν, είτε έξαφανίστηκαν, ένώ ένας, κελευστής, βρέθηκε ήδη νεκρός.

Μιά τελευταία έλπίδα ύπήρχε γιά νά περισώσουν ό, τι πλέον άπέμενε άπό τό χτυπημένο καράβι. Η ρυμούλ-

κηση. Ο πλοίαρχος ΄Α. Χατζόπουλος διέταξε τόν άνθυποπλοίαρχο νά πλησιάσει μέ κάθε τρόπο τά έπιβατηγά πλοία τού λιμανιού καί νά συνεννοηθεί σχετικά μέ τό έξαιρετικά έπείγον ζήτημα.

Από λεπτό σέ λεπτό αύξανόταν ή κλίση τού πολεμικού «Ελλη». Κι όμως ό κυβερνήτης, ψύχραιμος, δέν έγκατέλειπε τή θέση του. Περίμενε. Ελπιζε κι έδινε έλπίδες. Παράλληλα τό ένδιαφέρον του στράφηκε στή διάσωση όσων είχαν άποκλειστεί. Οί δραματικές στιγμές άναδείκνυαν έκείνες τις ώρες τίς διαχρονικές άρετές τού Ελληνα ναυτικού τήν άλληλεγγύη, τήν άνθρωπιά, τήν ύψηλή αίσθηση τού χρέους, τήν αύτοθυσία.

Ενα ρίγος διαπέρασε όσους έπιζούσαν, καθώς φάνηκε έπιτέλους νά πλησιάζει τό έπιβατηγό «Εσπερος». Τότε ό καπετάνιος, ταλαιπωρημένος άλλά μέ άπόλυτη αύτοκυριαρχία, διέταξε τούς άνδρες τού πολεμικού «Ελλη» νά κατέβουν στίς βενζινακάτους πού έφταναν, ένώ ό ίδιος θά παρέμενε. Ολοι έπέμεναν νά τούς άκολουθήσι, μά ό καπετάνιος φαινόταν άνένδοτος, μέχρι πού τόν άρπαξαν μέ τή βία καί τόν κατέβασαν κι αύτόν.

Η ρυμούλκηση είχε προετοιμαστεί. Καί οί ναυτικοί στό «Εσπερος» δέχτηκαν τό κέλευσμα τού καπετάνιου γιά «πρόσω». Η συγκίνηση όλων ήταν έκδηλη. Μά, καθώς τεντώθηκαν τά συρματόσχοινα, σέ λίγο, μετά άπό άπότομα άναπηδήματα, έσπασαν! Τότε ήταν πού ό πόνος τούς κυρίευσε. Τό εύδρομο «Ελλη» δέν μπορούσε νά σωθεί. Σέ λίγο τίποτα δέν θά άπέμενε στήν έπιφάνεια. Κί όμως. Είχε προσφέρει άκέραιο τό φόρο τιμής πρός τή Μεγαλόχαρη. Τού άξιζε πλέον παράσημο άνδρείας. Γι άυτό καί τά πλήθη στό λιμάνι ξεσπούσαν σέ ζητωκραυγές γιά τήν Πατρίδα.

Μετά τή θλιβερή τραγωδία πού συγκλόνισε τό πανελλήνιο, στό νησί τής Τήνου οί σημαίες κατέβηκαν μεσίστιες κι ό πένθιμος κτύπος τής καμπάνας συντονιζόταν στή θλίψη τών κατοίκων καί τών προσκυνητών. Ο πόνος δυνάμωνε τήν προσευχή. Μιά μυστική παρηγοριά κι έλπίδα χύθηκε στίς καρδιές, όταν ή άπόφαση νά γίνει τελικά ή λιτανεία τής είκόνας τής Εύαγγελίστριας διαδόθηκε παντού.

Μέσα σέ άτμόσφαιρα μοναδικής κατάνυξης καί ένότητας έζησαν όλοι τήν παρουσία τής Παναγίας σ΄ έκείνη τήν άλησμόνητη λιτανεία. Καί καθώς γινόταν δέηση γιά τά θύματα τού βυθισμένου «Ελλη», όλοι γονατισμένοι Τής έμπιστεύονταν μέ θέρμη καρδιάς τήν προστασία τού έθνους μας.

Ετσι προχώρησε ό Ελληνισμός στά δύσκολα χρόνια πού άκολούθησαν. Μέ πίστη στή βοήθεια τής Θεοτόκου. Καί ή Εύαγγελίστρια έκανε τό θαύμα της.

Ask the Elders | To the Pure All Things Are Pure

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many book have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to blessed by their words.

Question: Geronda, how can someone live a proper Christian life in today's society, without being scandalized by those who live far from God?

hy should anyone be scandalized by others who do not live close to God? If you were in a family with six or eight siblings, and one or two of them were led into error by Satan

to live a sinful life, would their sinful life scandalize you?

No, I would grieve, for they are my brother and sister.

— Well, then, the evil is within us. We have no love, and for this reason we do not consider all people our brothers and sisters and are scandalized by their life. We are all one big family and are brothers and sisters among ourselves, for we are all children of God. If we truly feel that we are brothers with all human beings, we will care for those living in sin and will not be scandalized by their sinful life, but instead will pray for them with pain. Therefore, if we are scandalized, the evil is within us; not outside. When you feel scandalized, you should ask yourself, "How many do I scandalize? In God's name, shouldn't I tolerate my brother or sister? How does God tolerate me with all the things I do?" Think of God, of Panaghia, the angels, who look upon all the people of earth as if standing on a balcony and looking down on a plaza they see some stealing, others fighting, still others sinning carnally, and so on. How does God tolerate them all? How is it that He can tolerate all the evil and all the sin on earth, and we cannot tolerate even one brother or sister? It is awful!

Question: Geronda, what does Saint Paul mean when he says that "God is a consuming fire?"

If you throw papers, trash into a furnace, what will become of them? Won't they be burned up and consumed? It is the same with a spiritual person; whatever temptation is thrown at him will be burned up and consumed. A consuming fire! When the divine fire lights inside man, everything is burned. No evil thought can stick to him. In other words, the devil will hurl at him all kinds of evil thoughts, but the spiritual man is a fire that burns them up. In which case the devil grows weary of doing this and eventually stops. This is why Saint Paul the Apostle also writes, "To the pure all things are pure." The pure see everything as pure; there is nothing impure. Even when thrown into the mire, the pure will remain pure like the rays of the sun which, no matter where they fall, remain bright and pure. The spiritual person is transformed for the better by the Saint, and is not irritated by the carnal person. He sees a carnal person and feels pain for him, but suffers no harm. Another person who is in a moderate state of spirituality is transformed for the better by a truly spiritual person; however, he is also transformed by a carnal person, but this time toward evil. A carnal person cannot distinguish a saint and

is provoked by another carnal person. And while the possessed sees the saint and flees, the carnal person approaches a saint in order to tempt him and to scandalize him. One who is debased to the condition of the Sodomites is scandalized even by the Angels. The humble person, even when inexperienced spiritually, can distinguish the Angel of God from the devil, because he has spiritual purity and is related to the Angel. Whereas the egoist and carnal man, besides being easily beguiled by the cunning devil, transmits cunningness himself, provoking with his carnality and harming the weaker souls with his spiritual germs.

Question: Geronda, how does one reach the spiritual state of being able to see everything as pure?

'he heart must be purified so the Grace of God may find a place to rest. Create in me a clean heart, O God. Isn't that what is written in the Psalm? When a man or a woman's heart is purified, then Christ comes to dwell in it, and then they no longer scandalize others, nor are they scandalized by others; rather, they transmit Grace and reverence. The person who is careful to maintain his spiritual purity also preserves divine Grace. Then he sees everything in the light of purity, and is also able to utilize the impure for good and spiritual purposes. This good work of spiritual transformation is accomplished in his good and spiritual factory. Useless papers are turned into clean and useful paper napkins, writing pads and so on, old and broken bronze objects are turned into candle sticks and candle stands. In contrast, the person who accepts deviousness and thinks deviously will turn even good things into bad, like the factories which make ammunitions; they will turn even gold into bullets and shells, because that is what their machines are made for.

When someone starts making concessions to sin, he darkens inside, the eyes of the soul are clouded and he can no longer see clearly. Moreover, he is polluted by sin, and sin confuses and entangles him, causing him to see even the pure as sinful. There are people who cannot believe, for example, that some young people live pure and chaste lives. "It's impossible for a such a thing to happen today," they say. These poor souls are so immersed in sin that they see everything as sinful. People who sleep with the demons (tangalakia) cannot imagine that others are sleeping with little angels. But we must not expect the swine to be respectful of the lovely lilies. You see, even Christ said, Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast your pearls before the swine, lest they trample them under their feet! For this reason, anyone trying to live a truly pure and spiritual life must be very careful never to be too bold before worldly people or allow that they are spiritually in the right, because they can do much harm and also be harmed themselves. Keep in mind that worldly people have another rule and another canonarch, and they cannot tell the difference between the Holy Myron and ordinary perfume.
