Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It has been a truly amazing month at Holy Trinity Church, filled with the emblematic marks of this community's life and character. It has been one during which we have been presented with opportunities to offer hospitality to others and have done so not simply at a level of obligation or minimal duty, but have received them with a zeal that truly meets Saint Paul's challenge above.

That is an attitude that pours forth from the heart of this community simply as part of who we are. Every now and then, however, there are special moments that allow us to reveal that heart in ways beyond doubt, and there were three of them this past month.

The first was the visit of His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios, which was indeed filled with honor. Naturally, the first honor was His Eminence honoring us by creating the opportunity for the visit during a very busy Consecration weekend in the area, making it the first visit of an Archbishop of America to Holy Trinity Church in decades. Our own sense of being honored, however, was equalled or surpassed in the experience of His Eminence being showered with love and honor by all the members of this community. Whether is was being received with a full church upon his arrival or being embraced by the children of the community with their special banners or interacting with the adults after Liturgy, it is quite evident from his expressions as well as his personal comments afterwards: he experienced love and honor in remarkable ways. I cannot offer deep enough thanks to the entire community for that beautiful day.

The second opportunity to show love and honor was at the hands of our Holy Trinity Choir as they hosted a meeting and lunch for the Mid-Eastern Federation of Greek Orthodox Church Musicians a week later (see page 14). Dozens of choir members and chanters from three states participated in very fruitful workshops and discussions, and they were indeed honored by the members of our choir—and by extension the entire community—in being offered the hospitality of our beautiful Church facilities and a wonderful lunch.

Finally, in pairing up the call of love and honor with the Lord's command to serve the poor and needy (Matthew 25:31-46), the Holy Trinity community excelled at both during the FOCUS Pittsburgh "Tackle Poverty with the Polamalus" Dinner on November 20 (pages 12-13). The excellent work of the committee and the generosity of those who supported and attended the event filled not only the Grand Room, but filled the philanthropic storehouses of FOCUS Pittsburgh with nearly \$100,000 to be used to feed, educate and medically treat the poor and needy of the Hill District near downtown Pittsburgh. Well done!

There are more signs of such love, including—just to name two—the wonderful philanthropy of our Philoptochos and the amazing generosity of dozens of gifts donated by the community for needy families. So in this season called "Advent," when we have been preparing to celebrate the coming of the Lord, I offer my deepest thanks that this community has put that preparation into action and focused more on giving than being given. more on serving hospitality rather than being served and more on showing Christian love and honor than focusing on our own needs. In doing so, we have prepared the manger of Christ coming not only into the world, but into our hearts and the lives of all those whom He gives us the privilege of serving in His Holy Name.

As we celebrate His Divine Incarnation, may the Lord bring you His peace and love in all you do. May the One Whose touch healed the blind and the lepers heal every wound of your body and soul. May He fill us with faith, strength and courage in all things to accomplish His holy will. And may He Who had no room in the inn (Luke 2.7) empower our hearts and our hands to always be ready to open the gates of hospitality and love to all He brings before us, for they are each made in His divine image and likeness. Father John Androutsopoulos

God, through the prophets promised a Messiah. Isaiah said of Him. "of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His Kingdom." So the people waited and hoped and looked for a king who would restore the earthly kingdom and rule on the throne of David. When the Messiah finally came, they could not accept the baby born in a lowly manger as their king. He had no regal status to them. He was just a humble carpenter's son.

> "Behold, I send my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to His temple." (Malachi 3:1)

The coming of the Messiah was preceded by His messenger, John the Baptist, a forerunner to make ready for Christ's coming. As we enter the Christmas season, we need to clear our minds and hearts of all sin – rid ourselves of anything that would block the Messiah's entrance. "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamor, and evil speaking be put away." Let every heart prepare room for Him. Only as we do this will God's promise become flesh in our lives.

"He was numbered with the transgressors; and He bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors." (Isaiah 63: 2)

Despite God's promise to send the Messiah and His eventual coming among us, many people have no knowledge of sins forgiven and the experience of living in the power of the Holy Spirit. We as Orthodox Christians have this opportunity in the life of the Church. St. Paul tells us that every promise of God finds its affirmation in Jesus Christ. When we direct the attention of our hearts to Him, the dimness of our eyes will fade away. Isaiah wrote many years before the birth of Christ: "The eyes of them who see shall not dim, and the

ears of them who hear shall hearken." (Isaiah 32: 3) We see what God in Christ has done for us and what, by transforming power of His Spirit, He is able to do for us today, day by day. We become aware of the thorough way in which Christ in His love takes care of us, and how wonderful the counsel of God is. We live each day, knowing that Christ is our mediator whom God promised and sent to reconcile us to Himself.

The Greatest Gift

"Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift." (Corinthi-

ans 9:15) St. Paul wrote these words to the people of Corinth in his second letter to them. What is this unspeakable gift? "She shall bring forth a son, and thou shall call His name Jesus; for He shall save His people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21.) This is the unspeakable gift to which St. Paul refers.

Christmas, the Nativity of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, means receiving the greatest gift. What greater gift to man than to be saved from his sin! Comfort and ease cannot compare with the saving

grace that makes Christmas Christ's Day. God's stars were the first Christmas candles. They symbolized a life so pure that no one can find a flaw in it. Nearly 2000 years after Jesus' birth, the light of that great personality shines on – and the darkness cannot put it out.

The first Christmas greeting was not written or printed; it was inscribed on human hearts. We think of the angel's greeting to the Virgin Mary, and the message of the angel to Joseph. We think of the first greetings from the angels to the Bethlehem shepherds. Christmas reveals all the beauty of divine nature. Christmas should always help us to have faith and hope, light and love.

This Christmas on the great and holy day of our Savior's birth, let us all lift up our voices with others everywhere around the world in gratitude for the spiritual riches Christ has brought into the world as a gift from our heavenly Father. We give thanks to the heavenly Father that His coming as a babe born in a lowly cave in Bethlehem means the dawning of the day of peace and good will among men all over the world.

CHRIST IS BORN! GLORIFY HIM! May the newborn Christ child bestow His blessings and love upon each and every member of our family here at Holy Trinity.



Christmas Message

CHRIST IS BORN! GLORIFY HIM! "We are writing this that your joy may be complete." (John 1: 14) This is our greeting to you, our message of Christmas. JOY! Christmas is the Feast of Joy. Christ the Savior of the world and the source of our joy, is born. It is He Who is the reason for our radiance of spirit and our lightness of heart. Joy means gladness and delight. In the language of faith, it means walking in the light, having uninterrupted fellowship with God and with man. It means having life, "coming alive"! "He who has the Son has life." (I John 5:12)

St. Paul advises us "to rejoice in the Lord always" (Philippians 4:4). It is worthwhile for us to note that we are asked to rejoice in the Lord. When we rejoice in the Lord we are grateful for all that He has done for us. We remember that He was born for our sakes. We have joy because we are looking at our world through the eyes of Christ. No person



May the joy that was the Virgin Mary's and the humility that was the shepherds and the Magi also be yours in great abundance as you relive the Nativity of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Savior of the world.

Joy To The World

Therefore in your land you shall possess a double portion; yours shall be everlasting joy. (Isaiah 61:7b)

Joy to the World! And the world could use a lot of joy. We open the newspaper and the face of poverty haunts us and our hearts are heavy with the seeming hopelessness of the poor. We turn on the TV and see children screaming and running from the terror of bombs, and young men killing each other; and we hate the stupidity and senselessness of war. Young people are jailed every day for possession of drugs.

What does God mean, "Yours shall be everlasting joy?" We do have everlasting joy. All we have to do is believe it and accept it. It's a sinful thing we do, not having joy in our hearts. We should be overflowing with joy all the time. In spite of the many sad and troublesome things in our world which we can't do very much about, we still have the one thing that should put joy in our hearts. We have a Savior. What else do we need? Meditate on this. Think about it. Then see if it isn't true: yours shall be everlasting joy.

The Wonder of Christmas

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the

government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called "Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9: 6)

We are anxious about Christmas and rush around spending more time and money that we should. Once it's all over we're exhausted and glad it won't happen again for another year. Of course, we have to check our bank balance to be sure we're not spending too much money; and we have to buy Christmas cards and there are cookies and fruit cake to make and shopping lists to write and parties to give and we're so busy we wonder each year how we do it. We can do it.

Perhaps during a few minutes of our Advent time, we can let the silence descend and think about the wonder and glory of the day we're going to celebrate. There is a wonder in Christmas. Let's not miss it.

Heavenly Father, I want so much to recapture the wonder of Christmas. Ever year I get nervous and irritable and bogged down with the rush of

Christmas, and every year I say, "Never again!" May the Lord Himself, who is our source of peace, give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with you all.

Under Marching Orders

When you help a needy person, do it in such a way that even your closest friend will not know about it, but it will be a private matter. And your Father, who sees what you do in private, will reward you. (Matthew 6: 3,4)

How do we find our way to Christmas? By showing off how generous we are toward people less fortunate than ourselves? And then dismissing them and their problems for the rest of the year? Not exactly! We Christians are under marching orders to examine our motives, to accept the responsibility that goes with giving. We have to be sure we aren't doing the right thing for the wrong reason. Charity with publicity is doing the right thing for the wrong reason. How do we find our way to Christmas? By remembering that acceptance of our Christian responsibilities is characteristic of a right relationship with God. One of our responsibilities is to give ourselves and our love along with our needful gift, and to do it so it's between us and God.

Prayer

May the blessings of Almighty God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be with us. Amen.




Spero | Mouse Tales: The St. Spyridon Church School Library Update

"Bartholomew's Passage" by Arnold Ytreeide follows the story of a young boy from the moment Roman soliders enter his village and set fire to it. They then make everyone slaves of the Roman Empire. Bartholomew and his parents are shipped away to Rome, and Bartholomew finds himself slave to a tyrannical master who shows no mercy. Bartholomew does not understand why God doesn't prevent bad things from happening to the people of his village. Why didn't He send an angel to protect them? But our loving God, He only wants the best for each of us and provides us with ways to choose the best every time.




Young Bartholomew makes the choice to escape with his new friend, Nathan, even though that quest for freedom may cost them their lives. Along the way, the two of them meet another new pal, Jotham. (See "Jotham's Journey" below!) Their travels bring them to Bethlehem, where they find the greatest Gift our Heavenly Father has ever given: His Son, Jesus.

"Jotham's Journey" is another book by the author of "Bartholomew's Passage." In it, Jotham's father is sent to the Valley of Hebron to sell some of their sheep. Jotham wants to go with him, but his father says no. "You're too young, it's dangerous, and your older brothers have enough responsibilities without looking out

after you." But Jotham in his anger runs away

over a hill where he can no longer see his father's tents. Even though he is very upset, he comes back to his senses and starts heading back over the hill to return to his village, until what he sees stops him dead in his tracks: His father's tents are gone! He runs and looks everywhere, screaming for his family, but they have vanished! "Where have they gone?" he wonders. So this brave 10-year-old begins his journey through Israel to find them. He faces thieves and even kidnappers, but he also meets shepherds and a friendly innkeeper. Finally, he finds his family in Bethlehem, and they are all caught in a blaze of angels proclaiming "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to men." He and his family follow the shepherds and, you guessed it, find Baby Jesus.



Maybe these two stories can help us during this holy Christmas season to remember that no matter what it takes to find Him, we must also seek Jesus in our life. Christ is born! Glorify Him!










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

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

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Ask the Elders | Spiritual Life in the Family

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be blessed by their words.

Question: Geronda, why do people grumble and how can it be avoided?

rumbling is caused by misery and it can be put aside by doxology (giving praise). Grumbling begets grumbling and doxology begets doxology. When someone doesn't grumble over a problem troubling him, but rather praises God, then the devil gets frustrated and goes off

to someone else who grumbles, in order to cause everything to go even worse for him. You see, the more one grumbles, the more one falls into ruin.

Whether or not we taste the blessings God gives us depends on us. But how are we to taste God's blessings, if He gives us, for example, bananas and we're thinking of whatever better things some ship-owner might be eating? How many people there are who eat only dry bread, but praise God day and night and are nurtured with heavenly sweetness! Such people acquire a spiritual sensitivity and are acquainted with the caresses of God. We don't understand these things, because our heart is caught up with filth and we are not satisfied with anything. We don't understand that happiness is in eternity and not in vanity.

Question: Do materials possessions have an effect on our spiritual life?

eople today have made their lives difficult, because they are not satisfied with a few things, but are constantly chasing after more and more material goods. But those who would like to live a genuine spiritual life must first of all be satisfied with a few things. When their life is simplified, without too many concerns and nuisances, not only will they be liberated from the worldly spirit, they will also have plenty of time available for spiritual things. Otherwise, they will tire themselves out by trying to follow the fashion of the times; they will lose their serenity and will gain only great anxiety.

And I see that people sometimes make a martyrdom out of their lives! Just today as I was coming with someone from Ouranoupolis, he invited me to go by his home for a little visit. He insisted, so I didn't want to disappoint him. As we reached the front door, I saw him take off his shoes and walk carefully on his toes. "Why are you walking like that?" I asked him. "It's nothing, Geronda; I am walking carefully so that I don't ruin the parquet," he said. What can you say? People are tormented for no reason.

The more goods people acquire today, the more problems they have. They neither thank God for His benefactions, nor do they take notice of the misfortunes suffered by their fellowmen to offer their charity. They just squander everything they have and don't give a second thought about the other man who doesn't have something to eat. Then, how can the Grace of God come to them? Even if one is a family man, he ought to put something aside for charity. He can tell his family that there's some sick and abandoned person or some poor family out there that needs help. Even if they don't have money to offer, he can say, "Let's give them one of our Christian books; we've got so many of them." By giving to those in need, one does well both for himself and for his family.

Question: Geronda, how can a family man practice virtue?

od provides opportunities. But a lot of men, while they're asking God to give them opportunities to practice virtue, grumble when they encounter difficulties. For instance, sometimes the Good God, in His infinite love and in order to provide the husband with practice in humility and patience, removes His Grace from the wife, and she becomes cranky, treating her husband badly. This is when the husband ought to thank God and gladly welcome the opportunity he is given to practice virtue and not complain. Or a mother asks God to grant her patience. Let's say she's got the table set for dinner and the little child pulls the tablecloth, spilling everything on the floor. This is as if the child is saying to the mother, "Mom, be patient!"

Generally speaking, the difficulties faced by people nowadays compel those who wish to live spiritually to be vigilant. It's just as when, God forbid, war breaks out and people have to be in a state of alert; those who are attempting to live spiritually have to do the same thing -be on alert. Just look at how difficult it is for the young children who wish to be close to the Church today! In a way, the war waged against them by the horrible environment in which they live helps them to be alert. You see, in times of peace, where there are no difficulties, most people slack off. But that's when they should take advantage of the peace and use it for their spiritual progress; that's when they should try to prune away their shortcomings and cultivate virtues.

Hesychia [quietness] is very helpful in spiritual life. It's good for one to set aside some part of the day in which to maintain quiet. He should examine himself in order to recognize his passions and struggle to overcome uproot them and thus purify his heart. If, in fact, there is a quiet and isolated room in the house, one reminiscent of a monastic cell, it would be very helpful. There, "in secret", one can carry out his spiritual duties of prayer and study.

A little spiritual reading or study, when carried out prior to prayer, is very helpful because the soul is warmed and the mind is transported to the spiritual realm. This is why, when one has many distractions and cares during the day, he should—if he has ten minutes for prayer—give preference to first studying something particularly strong for two minutes, in order to dispel the distractions.
