Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

Waiting. Waiting. Our world today is full of it.

We wait for traffic, for web pages to load, for our turn at the gas pump, for the elevator, in lines at the grocery store and bank ...

seemingly for everything. According to ask.com, "Human beings spend approximately six months of their lives waiting in line for things. That equates to about three days a year of queuing up." Six months of our lives! And most of it feels like it's wasted!

Even in the Faith, it feels like we get caught up in waiting. We wait for feast days to come, for Lent to end and for Pascha to come. And, according to the older translation of the Creed, "I <u>await</u> the Resurrection of the dead and the life of the age to come." Even the Psalms tell us to wait: "Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; yea, wait for the Lord!" (Psalm 27.14). Time spent with God, however, is never wasted.

But there's more to life than waiting. And this great and living Faith is about much more than waiting, because according to Saint Paul in 2 Corthinthians 6.2, "Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation." How can we tell those seemingly opposing commands apart? How do we know when to wait and when is "now?"

Perhaps they both serve the same purpose: to live in the moment for Christ. We call God "Pre-eternal" because the Holy Trinity is, indeed, outside time, which is a created dimension by which we measure days and lives. "He appointed the moon for seasons; the sun knows its going down. You make darkness, and it is night" (Psalm 104.19-20). As we anticipate the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, we know He is, according to the prayers of the Church, "Everywhere present and filling all things." So in this case, by liturgical tradition we wait to celebrate the Feast, but the Lord is with us now as He always is. In other words, the creation of time benefits and regulates our lives as creatures, but it does not contain or constrain the Creator. And He created it for us to live in it for Him.

So even while we are waiting, He is acting and we can be looking, preparing, praying. that is why the current translation of the Creed says, "I <u>look for</u> [Greek: *prosdoko*] the Resurrection of the dead and the life of the age to come." There is a sense of purpose and active anticipation there, not just passing the time, checking our texts and mentally checking out.

This season between Pascha and Pentecost gives of a deep sense of that purposeful and active waiting. We walk in the Resurrected Lord as we actively move toward the Feast of Pentecost and the fulfillment of His promise of sending the Holy Spirit in that special blessing and spiritual anointing as He did to the Apostles. The time is coming. Yet time is here for us to use even while we wait. The Lord is coming, yet He is also here and calling us. It is not an occasion to sit around and passively tap our fingers. It is our call to actively "look for" the Lord in our life, as St. Paul says. "making the most of the time" (Eph 5.16).

What are you waiting for? What are doing while you wait? Don't waste "now" just waiting for "then." According to Fr. Meletios Webber, "The sanctification of time occurs when we offer the present moment to God. We are not able to offer the past or the future, only the present moment."

May every moment of your life be blessed and offered to God, walking in His grace now and looking for His eternal blessings to come.

Mon., June 1: Feast Day of the Holy Spirit. This is the Nameday Liturgy of our parish (HT).


RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

After Pascha, What?

Christ is Risen! – Truly He is Risen!

"Jesus said to them, "Come and dine". And none of the disciples dared ask Him, "Who art thou?", knowing that it was the Lord. Jesus then came and took bread and gave it to them, and so with the fish. This is now the third time that Jesus showed Himself to His dis-

ciples, after He was risen from the dead." John 21: 12 -14.

There may have been one misconception in the way we

There may have been one misconception in the way we celebrated the Feast of Feasts – the Resurrection of our Lord

and Savior Jesus Christ. Surely it was a beautiful and glorious festival, with its joyous mood of worship and its happy spirit. The choir sang with inspired power. The sermon resounded with extra joy and uplift. The family spirit within the Church broke through with new meaning as we gathered to worship and celebrate the glorious Paschal services. It was a day of all days. And each of us came to its close with the feeling that it had been a rare experience.

Important questions must be faced. What did we do with those rare experiences? Did we meticulously wrap them up at the end of the day, enclose the message of the Risen Lord, and then carefully store the package away to be opened next Pascha morning? Or did we take the great Event and let it play upon the events of the common weekdays that followed a beautiful Sunday?

The meaning of Pascha to you and me depends on the

answers to these questions. We have much to learn from the disciples, who had known the early morning radiance of the Resurrection announcement, but who also had met the Master another morning when He approached them on the lakeshore where they were in their work clothes and where the smell of fish was in the air.

It was a mundane setting. "Come and dine," the Lord invited. He took the bread and fish and gave it to them. It was His third appearance to them after He had risen, and a nec-

essary one. In the same way the Spirit of Jesus comes to the believer today and adds fullness to the meaning of the Resurrection: in the morning at breakfast when we are dressed in working clothes, at school, in the family circle, when we are fishing for fun or for the market. Pascha is meant for a beautiful Sunday service, but for all these other times too.

Beloved, Pascha is much more than a historical event. It is an ongoing experience. The facts of the empty tomb were evident to the two Marys' who brought spices early that morning for what they thought would be a ritual for the dead. But the significance of the morning hardly dawned upon them until later. Likewise, the disciples and the two men of Emmaus did not immediately understand; the meaning of what happened slowly dawned on them after the Resurrection.

There is a divinely inspired purpose evidenced in the

Church Year that gives seven weeks to the celebration of Pascha. One day, or one week, would not have been enough time to absorb the tremendous mystery of the Risen Lord.



- 1) The first regulation, "that Easter must always be celebrated on a Sunday", was adopted because at that time there were Christians who celebrated Easter on Friday, that is on the day of "Crucifixion", rather than on the day of the Resurrection.
- 2) The second regulation, "that Easter must never be celebrated on or before the Jewish Passover", was adopted because according to the Holy Gospel, Christ was crucified during the week of the Hebrew Passover, and was taken down from the Cross on the eve of the Sabbath, and arose on the following day,



after the Jewish Sabbath.

3) The third regulation, "that Easter should never be celebrated on or before the vernal equinox", was adopted because otherwise Easter might be celebrated twice in one year, and when this happened, it would naturally not be celebrated at all in the following year.



Στον Πατέρα Μου






Stewardship: A Team Effort | Stewardship News

Stewardship is a team effort with many individual components. Each individual component is dependent on the other to carry out their responsibilities so that the team mission and goals are achieved. If one individual component fails to carry their own weight it places an "undue hardship" on the other components that in the long term can have detrimental effects on goals being achieved.




sion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that always having all sufficiency in everything, you may have an abundance for every good deed."

Ask the Elders | On Prayer

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be blessed by their words.

St. Porphyrios

Question: Geronda, how does the Lord teach us how to pray?

rayer is made only with the Holy Spirit. It teaches the soul how to pray. For we know not what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit itself makes intercession for us with groanings that cannot be uttered. It's not necessary for us to make any effort. We

should address ourselves to God in the manner of a humble servant with a voice of entreaty and supplication. Then our prayer will be well-pleasing to God. Let us stand devoutly before the Cross of Christ and say: 'Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me.' That says everything. When the mind moves in prayer, divine grace comes in a split second. The person then becomes full of grace and sees everything with different eyes. The important thing is to love Christ, prayer and meditation on His words. In prayer human effort represents only a tiny millionth part.

The Lord Himself will teach us how to pray. We won't learn prayer on our own, nor will anyone else teach us it. Don't let's say to ourselves, "I have made such-and-such a number of prostration, so now I have secured divine grace," but rather let us make entreaty for the pure light of divine knowledge to shine within us and open our spiritual eyes so that we may understand His divine words.

In this way, without realizing it, we love God without contorting ourselves and without exertion and struggle. What is difficult for man is easy for God. We will love God suddenly when grace overshadows us. If we love Christ very much, the prayer will say itself. Christ will be continually in our mind and in our heart.

Question: What else is necessary for true prayer?

Ge require divine eros—divine, burning love for Christ. Eros directs itself to a higher being. The Lover, God, desires the beloved, and the beloved strives to reach the Lover. The Lover loves His beloved with a divine and perfect love. God, who loves mankind, is selfless.

Love towards God is a higher love when it is expressed as thanksgiving. It is necessary for us to love not as a duty, but just in the way that it is necessary for us to eat. Often we approach God out of necessity to lean on Him because we find no repose in all the things around us and we feel deserted.

Divine grace teaches us our own obligation. In order to attract this grace we need love and craving. The grace of God requires divine eros. Love is sufficient to bring us into a suitable frame of mind for prayer. Christ will come on His own and He will stoop over our soul as long as he finds certain little things which gratify Him: good intention, humility and love. Without these things we cannot pray the words, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me."

Let's assume, for example, that we have a radio. When we turn the aerial to "position one," in the direction of the greatest number of transmitters, we hear the program loud and clear. At "position two" there aren't so many transmitters, and so the signal is somewhat less clear. At "position three" the program is virtually inaudible. The same is true for our communication with God. When our soul is turned facing "position one," communication is excellent. And that is due, of course, to two basic prerequisites: love and humility. With those prerequisites, the soul communicates with God, hears His voice and accepts His word. It receives strength and divine grace and is transfigured. It turns towards God in a natural way and feels compunction. When there is less love and humility—our "position two"—we have a correspondingly inferior communication with God. When our soul assumes "position three," communication breaks down almost completely, because we are filled with passions, hatreds and enmities and our soul cannot ascend.

Question: Geronda, what interferes with true prayer?

or Christ to enter within us when we invoke Him with the words "Lord Jesus Christ," our heart must be pure and free from all impediments. It must be devoid of hatred, egotism and malice. We must love Him and He must love us. If, however, our heart does harbor some thought of censure or ill will, there is still something we can do about it. The secret is to ask forgiveness or to make confession. But that, of course, as we said, requires humility. If you put the words of God into practice and are not troubled by pricks of conscience, you are calm and do good works, then you enter naturally into prayer without realizing it. Then you simply wait patiently until grace comes.

On every occasion when something happens to you, place the blame on yourself. Pray with humility and don't seek to justify yourself. If, for example, you find yourself the object of enmity, pray with love so that you pour love over the enmity. If you hear a slander against you, then pray and be careful, because the noise of murmurings shall not be hidden. The slightest murmuring against your neighbor affects your soul and you are unable to pray. When the Holy Spirit finds the soul in this state it does not dare to approach.

Turn your mind towards Him continually. Learn to love prayer, familiar converse with the Lord. What counts above all is love, passionate love for the Lord, for Christ the Bridegroom. Become worthy of Christ's love. In order not to live in darkness, turn on the switch of prayer so that divine light may flood your soul. Christ will appear in the depths of your being. There, in the deepest and most inward part, is the Kingdom of God. The Kingdom of God is within you.

- "Follow me!," Jesus says to each of us, by joyously receiving the true faith, committing yourself, your life, your mind, your heart, your talents and your resources to Him.
- "Follow me!," Jesus says to each of us, by living the Orthodox Faith with dedication and devotion in practice and in deeds.
- "Follow mel," Jesus says to each of us, by sharing the Orthodox Faith with the world that needs to receive it. Proclaim the Faith to all who will hear. Present it to all who will listen. Support those who practice the work of mission throughout the world.
- "Follow me!," Jesus says to each of us, by overcoming separateness and narrow nationalisms to make the witness of the Orthodox Faith unified and strong in our land.
- "Follow me!," Jesus says to each of us, and make Christianity a reality in the place where you live.
- You have your marching orders! Christ invites you and urges you to personally and positively respond, "Yes!" to His call, "Follow me!"
