

H ave no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.

Philippians 4.6

My beloved Holy Trinity family.

Here we are at the opening of another year in the Lord, and the question we are often asked—by others or by our own conscience—is, "What are your plans for the year?" For many of us, that question alone is enough to incite the anxiety Saint Paul speaks of above. After all, planning a day or a week can be stressful enough, let alone a year!

Much of that anxiety is born from a sense expectations that we have "a plan." I mean, doesn't everyone, from careers to personal wellness to projects and more? And then we get busy with that plan and need to come up with ways to figure out of we have succeeded or failed. It's a product of our results-driven culture, and it has worked itself into every area of life. But it often leaves little place for God.

We are blessed by our Creator with a sound mind and the ability to make responsible plans, And indeed, the Lord expects us to use them. "The plans of the diligent lead surely to



abundance" (Prov. 21.5) teaches us about the need to plan; And Jesus warns that a lack of plans can foil our work: "Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it?" (Luke 14.28). Then what's the problem?

It is when we think it's all up to us that plans tend to fall apart. As Al Rossi quotes from Metropolitan Anthony Bloom in his book, "Becoming a Healing Presence."

So long as you hold on to even a little hope of achieving something by your own powers, the Lord does not interfere. It is as though He says, "You hope to succeed by yourself—very well, go on trying. But, however long you try, you will achieve nothing."

What does that mean? "Plan...but not too much?" Not at all. "Plan, but start with God". Let's put it this way: rather than head off by ourselves to design our own "master plan," it is our calling to seek the revelation of "Master's Plan" in big and small ways for our life. In that sense, true Christian planning is more about discovery than invention. That is, it is about discovering the will of God for our life rather than inventing a plan on our own without even seeking divine guidance.

How can we make plans in the coming year for work? For relationships? For finances? For commitments? For fitness? For anything? Start with prayer and seek the plans and blessings of God in all we do. On Mount Athos, where we recently traveled to visit many monasteries, it is not unusual to hear the monks talking about plans and responding, "Να είναι ευλογημένο" ("Na einai eyvolgymeno" or "May it be blessed"). If we make that a foundation of all we do, we will protect ourselves from the pride of self-will and always put God's will first. And in doing so we seek the plans of Him "who wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2.4). Give it a try. Whatever you desire, whatever you plan, say "May it be blessed!"

May the Lord bless you with a divinely-inspired and guided New Year, and the revelation of the plans to live it out according to His will! Paternally yours in Christ.




Planning for Stewardship in the New Year

With the start of any new year comes the annual time to make plans for the next twelve months. Time to pick up with that gym membership again, to break out the healthy recipe book, and to cut back on the daily trips to the coffee shop.

Whether or not you are a resolution-maker, a good approach to the start of the new year is to set a goal for your stewardship contributions. Just as you plan your financial budget and carve out portions for your living expenses, your food, and whatever else you need, it also is wise to carve out a portion for your stewardship. Your contribution, no matter the amount, helps the church. Even if you feel that you can only give – in your eyes – a small amount, in God's eyes, he sees a good and faithful steward.

Your stewardship contribution is more than just a monetary donation. You can make a goal to give your talents as your stewardship to the church. If you are a master present wrapper after wrapping up your family's Christmas gifts, bring that skill to festival cooking at the church and wrap up trays of food to freeze for the festival. If you have a creative side and love to come up with fun crafts and projects, consider joining the Sunday School staff and teach a class. You love to sing, but you do not know how to speak or read Greek? That is perfectly fine; the choir welcomes you with open arms and will help you learn the lyrics to liturgical hymns! If you enjoy the competitiveness of sports, look no further than volunteering to do the clock for the GOYA basketball tournament in February. (Do you see where we are going with this?)

Your Stewardship Ministry is more than willing to help you identify an area in need of stewards if you are unsure of where you can use your times, talents, and treasures. Whether you come to church solo, with your family, with friends – the church needs all of your stewardship to thrive. When we come together as a community to give to our church, we sustain the life of the church and its ability to provide for all those who attend.



What is Stewardship?

Orthodox Christian Stewardship is a way of life, which acknowledges accountability, reverence, and responsibility before God. A primary goal of Stewardship is to promote spiritual growth and strengthen faith. Becoming a Steward begins when we believe in God, to whom we give our love, loyalty and trust and act on those beliefs. As Stewards, we affirm that every aspect of our lives comes as a gift from Him. Stewardship calls on the faithful to cheerfully offer back to God a portion of the gifts with which they have been blessed.

An Orthodox Christian Steward is an active participant in the life of the Church. The parish encourages all who accept the Orthodox Faith to become practicing Stewards. Each year the Steward is expected to carefully review his or her personal circumstances and make a commitment of time, talent, and treasure to support the Parish and her Ministries, which in turn support the National Ministries of our Archdiocese, Metropolises, and institutions.

Effective stewardship ministry is not a single event or project. Rather, it is going out to our people wherever they are in their walk with Christ, listening to their concerns, helping them to realize their importance as branches of the True Vine and encouraging them to offer their gifts in His service. We use various resources to support our efforts, but unless we meet with our people personally, sincerely listen to their ideas and concerns, and share a vision for the future of the parish, our efforts will not reach their full potential.

Stewardship is devotion and service to God and His Church as persons, as families, as a Parish, as a Metropolis, as a National Church, and as the Church Universal. Stewardship is our active commitment to use ALL our time, talent and treasure for the benefit of humankind in grateful acknowledgement of Christ's redeeming love.

Stewardship is caring for the needs of others.

Stewardship is offering one's self to God
as He offered Himself to us.

Stewardship is what a person does after saying
"I believe..." as proof of that belief.

(Williams and McKibben, "Oriented Leadership")

In the words of Fr. William Chiganos of Holy Apostles Church in Westchester, Illinois, "...people don't give to need; they give to vision.... Church people don't stretch their giving because of need to meet the budget; they give more because they are able to see a vision of people being reached and God's purposes being accomplished in the life of the church and its ministry." Parishes with successful Orthodox Christian Stewardship Programs have found that incredible support is unleashed from Stewards who unselfishly and joyfully offer their time, talent and treasures, which in turn enhances the spirituality and ministry of the local parish.





"What is Theophany?"

Every year on January 6th, the Orthodox Church celebrates the Feast of Holy Theophany, which is the baptism of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This is one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Church and is also known by the name, "Epiphany." The Baptism of Christ in the River Jordan at the hand of St. John the Baptist sets the example for our own baptism by water in the Holy Spirit.

"How do we celebrate Theophany?"

The main celebration is, of course, found in the Church with the holy services on January 5th (the Forefeast), January 6th (Theophany) and January 7th (Synaxis of St. John the Baptist). We also take the feast home with us by having our homes blessed with the Holy Water.

"What happens during a House Blessing?"

ahead. When the priest arrives, he will conduct a brief service either in your dining room or at the place where your family usually offers its prayers. It is best to have the entire family present if possible, especially children. Please be sure to have an icon and a list of the first names of all the members of your household. If you have a home censer, you may prepare it also. A bowl of water is not necessary, as the priest will bring the holy water sprinkler from the church.

The priest will offer the blessing service and offer the names of the people present and those contained on the family names list in prayer. As the service concludes, please lead the priest throughout the house to sprinkle the holy water while chanting the hymn of Theophany. He will bring a copy of the service so you can follow along and chant the hymns. When the service is over, please understand the priest needs to keep the visit brief in order to cover all the homes scheduled on that day.

"Should I Have Our House and Business Blessed Every Year?"

Yes! In the Orthodox Christian tradition, homes should be blessed each year to bring the blessings of the Feast of Theophany into the home and to rededicate ourselves and our family to the Lord. It is an annual commitment, celebration, thanksgiving and family prayer. It is also a pious way of asking God's blessings on our business and livelihood as good stewards of all His gifts.

Ask the Elders | The Extraordinary Actions of God's Grace (Part I)

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be inspired by their wisdom, formatted in a question-and-answer interview approach.

Gheronda, why is it important for us to understand God's grace?

hose who are seeking God's favor must especially know about and recognize the extraordinary actions of God's grace because in them, more clearly and distinctly than anywhere else, the characteristics of a grace-filled awakening are manifested. We must be fully aware of these characteristics and understand them, so that we can evaluate what we experience.

How does that grace manifest itself in our daily life?

The true Christian life is the grace-given life. Self-made life—however beautiful in appearance it may be and to whatever outward forms of the Christian life it may adhere—can never be Christian. The beginning of the true Christian life is established in a grace-given awakening. The one who responds to this action of grace is not deprived later of the guidance of grace or the communion with this grace during the time that he is faithful to its inspirations. That is why we must make clear to ourselves whether this grace-given awakening has occurred in us.

Gheronda, how do we know we are experiencing that grace?

When a grace-given awakening takes place in the consciousness of a man, there is an instantaneous destruction of the whole order of his willful and sinful life, and simultaneously the revelation before his consciousness of another divine order which is the one true and spiritually soothing order.

Briefly one may depict this order as follows: God, who is worshiped in the Holy Trinity, who created this world, who sustains and providentially cares for it, saves us fallen sinners through the Lord Jesus Christ by the grace of the Holy Spirit, and under the guidance and supervision of the Holy Church. God leads us in the way of the cross, tests us in this life, and brings us to the eternal life of everlasting bliss. This divine order includes and contains all people, events, and institutions, and even the very principles by which everything runs. This entire order, through the action of grace, vividly engraves itself upon the spirit of a sinner.

By contrasting this divine order to everything that he previously lived and delighted in, the sinner is then obliged to be in absolute accordance and harmony with this divine order. All this strikes him. Every feature of the divine order condemns and rebukes him with his former unreasonableness and carelessness. This impresses him all the more because, at the same time, his spirit sees the obvious insignificance of the former sinful order, which deserves his contempt.

By this action the heart is released from its former bondage and becomes free. So it is free to choose its new kind of life. This is the limit of the action of a grace-given awakening. It destroys in the consciousness and feeling of a man everything he formerly valued, and vividly shows him what is better. It leaves the stricken and startled man in this state free to choose the new or to revert again to the old.

This sounds like it could be quite a dramatic experience?

It is remarkable that this grace-given awakening is always accompanied by a startling and by some kind of a fright. This startling and fear occur perhaps because of the suddenness of the awakening. This awakening is like grabbing a sinner at the crossroads of life as if he were a criminal, and placing him before the inexorable judgment of God. Or this startling may take place because the new order which is being revealed to his consciousness is so absolutely new for him and so strikingly opposed to his former order. And this new order is not only new, it is also perfect in all its parts and bliss-giving. In the former state, there is only a sense of sorrow in the heart and the destruction of the spirit.

How can we prepare ourselves for this grace?

Our spirit, as we have seen, is closed and stifled by many coverings. But by its nature, the human spirit is a spectator of the divine order. This capacity for contemplation is immediately ready to manifest its power, and it really does manifest itself as soon as the obstacles which have bound this capacity are removed.

Therefore, in order to awaken the slumbering spirit in a man and to introduce it to contemplation of the divine order, God's grace acts either:

- directly upon the spirit, filling it with strength and power, giving it the opportunity to tear loose from the bonds which bind it; or
- indirectly, as if gradually shaking off these covers and nets from the spirit and by this, giving the human spirit the freedom to be in its own order.

In its direct action, this omnipresent and all-penetrating divine grace invisibly inspires and guides a man's spirit by imprinting on the spirit the thoughts and feelings which separate it from finite and mortal things. This turns the spirit towards the other, better world, though it is invisible and unknown. Common features of these awakenings are dissatisfaction with oneself and with everything about oneself, and a vague sorrow. A man becomes dissatisfied with everything that is around him. He is not satisfied with his abilities and accomplishments, nor with what he has, even if it were incalculable wealth; and he is as if brokenhearted. Not finding consolation in anything visible, he turns towards the invisible, accepts it with willingness and readiness, and sincerely assimilates it into himself and himself into it.
