

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.

Psalm 50[51]:10

My beloved Holy Trinity family.

I remember well the story my mother used to tell about her own mother, my Yiayia, and the heart problems she had back in the 1950's. She had a blockage that required an operation to give her a "clean heart," and as a result she was the first patient to receive open heart surgery at the Harrisburg Hospital. By God's grace, the operation was successful and she went on to live another 30 years, faithfully serving her family, her Church and her God.

Medical procedures have come a long way since then, including heart transplants and

We must attend to our heart and cultivate it. for the hidden man of the heart is very precious in the sight of God. May God give us such a heart, a deep heart that is capable of divine and spiritual sensation!"

Father Zacharias of Essex Remember Thy First Love even heart procedures to save babies still in their mother's womb. In each case, there is a disease or condition present that endangers the heart and, thereby, the life of the patient. Doctors do their best to correct the condition and give the one who is suffering a "clean heart."

The Orthodox Christian Church has always had a great appreciation for such skills, when used within the teachings of the Faith. Even back as far as the 4th century, Saint Basil wrote this about the correct use of medicine: "God, the Governor of life, has made us the gift of medicine, the skill to remove what is superfluous and to supply what is lacking, and in this way to be a symbol of the art of healing our souls."

Importantly, besides appreciating the gift of physical healing, this great hierarch and theologian says it gives us a good way to understand the importance of spiritual healing. "The Christian, in

accepting their healing, knows how they reveal the glory of God and sees in them a mirror of the healing that is needed by the soul." And there is no better place to go for the healing of our heart and soul than the Church, which offers comfort, guidance and cleansing by the grace of the Holy Spirit.

The heart plays crucial roles in both our physical and spiritual lives. Author Al Rossi writes, "The human heart is the entrance to an inner chapel where we can hear, with all creation, praise to God. The heart is the entrance to love, to the place of healing balm." So the heart and the healing and cleansing of it are the focus of our Lent 2020 theme, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me," taken from Psalm 50 [51], a penitential, cleansing and restorative written by King David and used at many of our worship services.

I encourage each of us to engage in the teachings, sermons, presentations, services and prayers this Lent that will focus on that topic. Perhaps your spiritual heart pains you already, or maybe you are not even aware of the hidden conditions that may be afflicting it. Either way, treatment, therapy and even prevention are all in the hearthealing toolkit the Church has been using for two-thousand years, including Holy Confession, Communion, anointing, prayers, fasting and more. May we all indeed have "heart healthy" Lent! Kali metanoia!

New "Safety And Security Ministry" Announces Security

Presence Outside Sunday Services Starting March 15

A new "Safety and Security Ministry" was recently formed by the Parish Council to assess the safety and security needs of our church and to develop a comprehensive church security plan, including the need for security presence on Sunday mornings. This is a practice being adopted by many churches today. After reviewing several proposals from security ex-




perts in the area, the ministry team has decided to employ the Town of McCandless Police and Fire Departments to provide an extra layer of security each Sunday morning and during other special church services. Beginning on Sunday, March 15th, you will see a uniformed police officer and his patrol car outside our church building. He is there strictly as an added level of precaution and a visible sign that Holy Trinity Church takes security seriously. Please note that we have not received any reports of a threat or concern whatsoever. We are simply being proactive and responsible for the safety of the entire Holy Trinity family. Additional measures currently under discussion are upgrading our security and alert systems and developing safety evacuation procedures involving all parishioners. More information about the work of this new ministry team will be available as progress continues. It is our goal to keep the parish informed, and to remind us all that no matter how we prepare, ultimately we have only One True Shepherd and Guardian of the flock: "The Lord is faithful, and he will strengthen you and protect you" (2 Thess 3.3).

Pilgrimage to the Holy Land Reservations Available

The Holy Trinity Pilgrimage Ministry has opened reservations for its 2020 trip - "A Journey of Faith: Pilgrimage to the Holy Land." The 10-day trip runs from November 4-13 and will feature visits to the Sea of Galilee, the River Iordan. Mount Tabor, Cana, Nazareth, Bethlehem and more. 

Ask the Elders | Giving Thanks in All Things

One of the great blessings of Orthodoxy is the presence, prayers and inspired words of the Holy Elders of the Faith. They have been referred to as "precious vessels of the Holy Spirit." In recent years, many books have been published in English with their writings and talks. This column provides an opportunity for each of us to be inspired by their wisdom, formatted in a question-and-answer interview approach.

Gheronda, how does giving thanks bless us?

t. Barsanuphius says that thanking God makes up for our shortcomings and intercedes before God for our weaknesses. If we give ourselves over to the spirit of thanksgiving, God showers upon us even greater blessings, inspiring us to ever-increasing fervor. And there comes a point when we see God's providence everywhere we look. We will thank Him for every breath of air,

as we say in one of the prayers during the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. The spirit of thanksgiving also leads man to repentance, because he senses that his fallenness stops him from offering such gratitude as is worthy of God.

And this spirit of thanks brings us closed to the Saints too?

We benefit from the prayers and intercessions of the Saints for the whole world whenever we give thanks to God for all the gifts we have been granted. And the same thing happens when we thank Him for His benefits towards all men, at all times and in all places. It is for the benefit of all that God bestows His gifts upon us, and this is so especially with respect to His spiritual gifts to His Saints and, even more especially, those to His Most Holy Mother.

When we thank Him for them, it is like celebrating our own liturgy before God, similar to the Divine Liturgy. Thanking God generally broadens our heart, and thanking Him for His gifts to our brethren makes them ours so that, in a mysterious way, we are spiritually enriched. As the Apostle [Paul] affirms, "All things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might through the thanksgiving of many redound to the glory of God." Not only does a spirit of gratitude conquer the ugly passion of jealousy, it also enriches us with the gifts of our brethren, and God is glorified.

How does giving thanks bring us into a better relationship with others around us?

Whenever we stand before God in prayer we should carry within our hearts our whole family or community, and each of its members in particular: if there are forty of us, forty people should be present in my heart. The Lord enjoins us to be united as one man by His Spirit, that there be no division among us. And if we all have this in mind and live by the same thought, this unity will be given us by God, and no member of the community will be absent from our heart as we stand in prayer.

The Body of Christ is manifest in every community on which God pours out His grace. His gifts are numerous and each member receives a particular charism, Christ Himself being invisibly present as the Head of the Body which contains the fullness of His grace. And because the Body is one, its

members benefit from each other's strength: the strength of the Head passes to the leg, and the strength of the arm passes to the foot and vice versa. And as the Apostle says, "When one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honored, all the members rejoice with it."

Every member of our community therefore has a place in my heart as I stand before God in prayer and give thanks for them. I am then, in a mysterious way, gifted forty times over.

What kind of prayers can we offer in this spirit of unity?

When we pray, whether in church or in our rooms, we could begin with a prayer such as this:

Lord, I come before You together with all my brethren.

Bless us as we stand before You

Make our souls and minds rejoice

in the invocation of Your Holy Name.

Pour out Your grace upon us all.

Fill our hearts with the great comfort of Your goodness, and let none of us leave Your holy temple without the incorruptible consolation of Your Spirit.

This kind of prayer begets a spirit of unity and draws down on us such blessings that we will not want to stop praying. And a strange wonder: this prayer gains in strength the more we pray.

God will bless the whole community, strengthening it and consoling the hearts of all. He Himself will inspire us to deeper prayer for our brethren for the sake of His love for them. He will fill us with His gifts, with peace and love for each other. We will fulfill the words of the Apostle Peter: 'Love the brotherhood fervently', or 'extensively', as the Greek text has it.' Every meeting with a brother will be a prophetic event — not in the sense of foretelling the future, but in the sense of bearing witness to God's will for man, that the truth of God be manifest in us.

As members of one Body, each is responsible for the health of the whole Body. We have a duty to defend the life of the Body. The Lord says, "If you bring your sacrifice to the temple and there remember that thy brother has something against you; leave there your gift, and go and first be reconciled to him." He is not telling us to be reconciled when we know we have offended someone — that goes without saying — but when a brother has no peace because of us, even though we are not to blame. God wants us to humble ourselves as much as we can before our brother, regardless of the apparent justice of the matter. Our brother's heart will then be moved by our humility and he will be able to draw near to God again. In this way we work with God for his salvation.

Do you fast? Give me proof of it by your works.

If you see a poor man, take pity on him

If you see a friend being honored, do not envy him.

Do not let only your mouth fast, but also the eye and the ear and the feet and the hands and all the members of our bodies.

Let the hands fast, by being free of avarice.

Let the feet fast, by ceasing to run after sin.

Let the eyes fast, by disciplining them not to glare at that which is sinful.

Let the ear fast, by not listening to evil talk and gossip.

Let the mouth fast from foul words and unjust criticism.

For what good is it if we abstain from birds and fishes, but bite and devour our brothers?

May He who came to the world to save sinners strengthen us to complete the fast with humility, have mercy on us and save us.
