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

The Days of Pre-Lent

A Time of Preparation

The Sundays of Pre-Lent

Before Great Lent begins this year – on Monday, Feb. 27th – our Holy Orthodox Catholic and Apostolic Church tries to prepare us for this time of spiritual renewal. For four Sundays prior to the Great Fast, we are prepared for this great spiritual experience. The Church, through the Gospel lessons, guides us along the path of repentance to Christ.

The Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee (Feb. 5): What is the Triodion? A sacred book of the Church used for pre-lent and the Great Lent. On the first Sunday of the Triodion we learn the power of humble prayer and humility. (Luke 18:10-14).

The Sunday of the Prodigal Son (Feb.

12): The second Sunday of Triodion offers us a picture of repentance (the younger son) of love, of forgiveness and of envy (the elder son). From this parable we learn that for the repentant soul, spiritual joy is never too late to be found; the Church always welcomes those who sincerely repent of their evil ways and seek to walk the path of righteousness again (Luke 15:11-32).

Meatfare Sunday (Feb. 19): The lesson from the third Sunday of the Triodion is the Last Judgment. It reminds us of the terrible day of the Last Judgment when all who have lived from the beginning of man will face the righteous King and Judge. We are also reminded of our need to perform acts of virtue, to be

compassionate, merciful and charitable. (Matthew 21:31-46).

Cheesefare Sunday (Feb. 26): On the fourth Sunday of the Triodion and the last Sunday before the Great Lent, the theme is the lost Paradise and ways to regain it: to forgive, to observe the laws of fasting humbly and to "lay up treasures in heaven and not on earth (Matthew 6:14-21).

A Call For Renewal

This Pre-Lenten period of four Sundays is a time of invitation to each of us. The Church calls each of us to make good use of the coming time for spiritual renewal. The Church offers us these Gospel lessons as examples of God's great mercy. The Church encourages us to be repentant and implores us to obey God's Commandments if we desire to be reconciled with Him. Let us accept humbly the invitation that the Church extends to us. Let us deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow Him, as He commanded us to do - thus we will receive from Him the Divine Grace which He has in store for those who are faithful to Him and His Holy Church.

How Can We Prepare Ourselves?

SET A GOAL: First of all, set a goal for yourself – a spiritual goal. Then through daily prayer, fasting, repentance, confession, Holy Communion and continuing thoughtfulness, strive to reach it.

ATTEND SERVICES: What else can we do during this period of preparation? To reach your spiritual

goal, resolve to participate in the services of the Church. The Divine Liturgy on the Lord's Day is a solemn obligation.

PRAY: Pray and meditate daily. Prayer and meditation are food for the soul. Read the Holy Scriptures and think about what you have read. Also, read other spiritual books. You will find inspiration and spiritual uplifting in reading religious books.

GIVE: Give of yourself and of your material resources. How can you give of yourself? Visit the sick, the aged and the lonely. Volunteer to undertake Church projects; with God's help, they are easy and rewarding.

RESOLVE: Resolve to raise your contributions, your Sunday offering to the Church. Give up a pleasure or an entertainment so that you can do this. Every Orthodox Christian is called upon to prepare himself for the Great Lent, which this year begins on Monday, February 27th. ❖

The Beauty of Your House

"O Lord, I love, the beauty of Your house; and the place where Your glory dwells." (Psalm 26.8)

oday, dear brothers and sisters in Christ, our Holy Trinity Church is more beautiful than the last time you were here. And every time you enter over the next two months, it will be more beautiful that the last time. Why? As you all know and have supported, we are - by the grace of God - completing the iconography of this sacred space.

We could simply sit in awe and wonder today, but there will be many more years to come for that. Today, the first Sunday of our iconography completion project, it seems fitting that we should spend a little time understanding just why we are doing this, then meet our wonderful friends from Greece who, through the divinely-inspired talents they have brought with them, are actually completing this work for us and for the glory of God.

What is an icon? The word icons comes from the Greek work " $\epsilon\iota\kappa\dot{\omega}$ ", which means "to imitate" or "to be like." According to Saint Basil, the essence of an icon is the imitation of its prototype, or the original person or scene it represents.

How do icons communicate their message? "Icons...speak a 'new' tongue, a most perfect tongue which is simultaneously the language of the Gospels and the Church's liturgical



life...It is important that we all learn and attain an appreciation of this language so we can enter into the otherworldly realm of the Spirit, the place of Sanctity and Holiness...so we can enter into the transfigured world of

God to which the icon points" (What Do You Know About Icons, xi).

Let's look at a few more things that icons are...and are not.

Icons are religious art, but they are not just religious artwork. There are many kinds of religious forms throughout the art world. Icons are for Orthodox Christians indispensable liturgical elements that sanctify believers and raise our intellect to the mystical knowledge of God. By means of the inspiration icons bring into our life, we progress "toward the new earth in mystery" according to Saint Basil.

Icons are spiritual invitations.

They invite us to communicate on a spiritual level with the archetype, or the person they represent. Icons inspire hymnographers to compose hymns; they inspire theologians to teach, they inspire clergy to preach and they fill our hearts with the remembrance of the miracles, saints and wonders they proclaim.

Though it is often said that one of the uses of icons in the early Church was to teach through images the lessons of Christ, His salvation and His saints to those who were uneducated, lakovos Mainas says "The icon is not simply books for the uneducated, as if the educated have no need for them. They teach us all not because they inform us, but because they lead us to

Heaven."

Icons are also windows, through which the people of God, His Holy Church, are drawn to contemplate the Kingdom of Heaven. That is why true Orthodox iconography is governed by tradition and discipline which holds it true to the teaching, history and theology of the Church. The colors, lines, clothing, expressions, objects and every other aspect of Orthodox iconography carries the great responsibility of "the inheritance of the truth and the duty to proclaim it evangelically to the world."



We may stand in awe of the beauty and the artistic aesthetic of icons, but Father Vasilios of the Holy Monastery of Iviron on Mount Athos says we need to go beyond that. "Let us stand in worship. Let us receive life. Let us nurse; let us take in; let us drink from them, insatiably, because what nourishes us now can never be exhausted. Those who show veneration [to the holy icons] and those whom [the holy icons represent] are alike in the power and sanctifying grace of the Spirit who has neither beginning nor ending."



So now that we better understand the purpose, tradition and language of icons, let's move on to the phenomenon at hand: the icons of Holy Trinity Church.

Thanks to the great and sacrificial love the members of this parish family have for their mother, the Church, we were blessed to be able to open this new sacred space ten years ago with a large part of the iconography completed. That, dear ones, is a rarity

in Orthodox churches, especially in America. Parishes often wait 20, 30 years or more to even begin their iconography, and many never do because iconography was not "baked into" their projects as it was for ours. But you loved your Church so much and the supporters of our building fund were so generous we all said, "We will not open with nothing but white walls staring at us for years to come."

Once we as a community committed to making that happen, by God's grace we found the man who could make that possible. The Lord sent us a true servant of Christ, Dr. George Kordis, a master Iconographer from Greece, along with a team of divinely-inspired co-workers, who were amazingly able to complete the upper icons and the Holy Altar area in only six weeks. Thousands of people who have worshiped, toured and visited this sacred space since then in the



last ten years have been awed, inspired and blessed by that holy work.

When I asked Dr. Kordis back then what his impression of the space was when he walked in to begin his work, he said of our architect, Christ Kamages, "He has given us a good canvas to work with." Indeed, George, you have done well with that canvas and are well on the way to completing this holy masterpiece.

ASK THE ELDERS SAINT PAISIOS OF ATHOS

GOD GIVES GRACE TO THE HUMBLE

What God desires from us is to have a little humility, in order to have kinship with Him, and then all His gifts come abundantly, one after another.

Geronda, why is humility so necessary for our spiritual life?

Humility is the single most important virtue; but since this is not easily understood, then I would also add love.

Abba Isaac says, "What salt is for any food, humility is for every virtue."

In other words, without humility...the virtues will be "inedible"! The saint wants to emphasize how necessary humility is in working on virtues. If a person does not have humility, no virtue can come near him.°

Geronda, which virtues are needed for one to be overshadowed by the Grace of God?


Humility alone will suffice. If one becomes humble, he can instantly be immersed in divine Grace, become an angel and find himself in Paradise. On the contrary, if he becomes prideful, he can turn into a devil in a moment's time and find himself in Hell. In other words, one can become a lamb if he wants to; he can also become a goat if he wants to. The poor goats can never become lambs, even if they want to; but God has given us humans the ability to change from being a goat to being a lamb — it is enough that we want to do so.

The Grace of God is extended only to the humble and meek person. That is where the Spirit of God finds respite. Do you know what Prophet Isaiah says? "But to this man will I look: even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembles at My word."

What God desires from us is to have a little humility, in order to have kinship with Him, and then all His gifts come abundantly, one after another. For, in a way, God owes much Grace to the humble person, and so He gives it to him as a gift, without being asked to do so. This is a spiritual law. "God resists the proud, but gives Grace unto the humble; is this not written in the Gospel? This is how God has arranged it. "To be humble" means, "I have divine Grace."

A very humble person receives much Grace from God, for the humble person absorbs divine Grace like a sponge.

Humility opens the doors of Heaven and then the Grace of God comes to people, whereas pride closes them. Father Tychon used to say, "One humble individual has more Grace than many persons together. Each morning God blesses the people of the world with one hand, but when He sees a humble person, He blesses him with both hands. He who has greater humility is the greatest of all!"



Saint Paisios of Athos

Everything depends upon a humble frame of mind. When one has a humble frame of mind, then earth and Heaven come together naturally.

What did Christ say? "Learn of Me, for I am meek and lowly in heart, and ye shall find rest unto your souls." One humble thought immediately generates the Grace of God.

I have noticed that one humble thought makes a person shine, makes him beam.

Geronda, if one is prideful and places one humble thought in his mind, will God help him?

Well, if he thinks one humble thought, then he will not be prideful; he will be humble, and God will help him. People fluctuate; they go one way and then another — depending on what kind of thoughts they have. The proud person can be helped by thinking a humble thought. And the humble ceases to be humble by thinking one proud thought. In order for humility to become one's permanent condition such that the Grace of God remains within him, spiritual work is required.
