

My beloved Holy Trinity family,

Honoring the past. Reaching toward the future. Throughout this blessed and historic Centennial year at Holy Trinity Church, we have opened our arms wide to embrace both sacred tasks. To fulfill our calling as a Church, both are necessary, because the past can imprison us if we only focus on looking back and the future will leave us longing for the days to come if we only look forward. Living up to our calling in the present allows us to appreciate where we've been and anticipating the future helps us understand where we're going. It is that fullness of the Holy Trinity community with all its yesterdays gone by and all its tomorrows to come that has brought us to where we are today.

Let us all confess that we have indeed had One Great Leader who has inspired, equipped and empowered us to do the impossible. We have been led by the Holy Spirit of God Himself. He has led. We have followed. To Him and to Him alone goes all praise. If we dare open our eyes to His presence among us, we and generations to come will indeed behold His glory.

Now, as we look back with thanks over a glorious and historic Centennial, I offer my pastoral and paternal thanks and prayers for every parish ministry leader, every donor, every faithful servant of God and every prayerful soul that has been, is and will be part of the Holy Trinity community. May we enter the next 100 years of Holy Trinity Church in peace with the love of Christ in our hearts and His light burning brightly in our souls. God bless you all. Christ is born!



Now What?

Father John's Homily the Week After the Consecration of Holy Trinity Church

ow! What an amazing time it has been. Holy Trinity Church is now complete. Consecrated last weekend.

That was after the beautiful new interior woodworking was installed in October. That was after the magnificent iconography was completed in March. That was after the mortgage was paid off in 2020. That was after the church was officially opened in 2013. That was after we moved twice in two years from the North Side in 2011 to a temporary school while our new church was being built. That was after looking at 99 other possible locations until God led us to this one. That was after starting a Capital Campaign in 2008 during the financial crisis. That was after a rather challenging time of questioning where our future lay. And that was after unanimously adopting a mission and vision that has ultimately led us here today.

Whew! What a journey it's been!
Perhaps like the Israelites wandering in the desert heading toward the Promised Land, the thought might occur to us, "It's been a long haul. We've arrived. We're done." As I have pondered that temptation myself, the response that I keep hearing in my heart is exactly the opposite. Rather than, "Sit back, relax and enjoy," there is a question we should all be asking ourselves as faithful members and as a community. And the question is this: "Now what?".

We have been so blessed as a community it is hard to describe. Last weekend's Consecration and Centennial celebration truly affirmed the love the people of this community have for their Church and the love the Lord has for them. He multiplied every gift and honored every sacrifice beyond what anyone could imagine. Isn't it tempting, then, to look back in awe, relax...and stop looking forward?

Actually, Jesus Himself told this little story about that a long time ago. It goes like this: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you

have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God" (Luke 12.16-21).

Hearing that parable as a Holy Trinity parishioner at the end of this part of our long journey, the inevitable first question must be, "Now what?" And that give birth to so many more? If it hasn't been to lay up the treasure of this beautiful new church as a testimony to all the work it took to get here, then what was it all for? Why are we here? What do we do with all of this? What is God expecting of us now?

Here are a few answers. First, God has already laid out the plans for our next 100 years. The exciting news about that is it's waiting to be discovered. You might recall that our 2023 Church School theme is "Trust in the Lord," but remembering the entire quote from Proverbs 3 might be of great help here: "Trust in the

Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths." So the parable teaches that we shouldn't "rest on our laurels" but Proverbs reminds us that we can rest secure in the sure knowledge that God will continue to direct us in everything. "He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus" (Phil. 1.6)

Second, have you ever heard the expression, "a good kind of tired?" It's often used after a project or event that has taken a lot of effort. Or even after an intense exercise workout that ends panting and sweating. That's not the kind of tired that leaves us depleted and empty, but renewed and ready for what lies ahead. Eagles use a lot of energy to spread and move those big, beautiful wings, and the Prophet Isaiah uses that image to encourage us as well: "Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint" (Isaiah 40.31). My dear Holy Trinty family, it's not time to be weary. It's time to soar.

Third, this great Holy Trinity adventure has not led us to the end, but has set us up for a new beginning. The church is indeed beautiful, but it was never the final destination. There is so much more ahead. There is so much more good the Lord has called us to. If He empowered us to accomplish all this while wandering from place to place and living in a run-down school while doing it, imagine what lies ahead. As Saint Paul reminds the Christian in Galatia, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (Gal 6.9). Not sure what that harvest is, how to plant for it and when to reap it? No



worries. Trust in the Lord. Today's Epistle ends with that hope: "He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your resources and increase the harvest of your righteousness." We might not know how and when yet, but God knows. And we trust Him. "I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord [in Jeremiah 29.11], "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

So as we go forth from here, it is the challenge for us both as a community and as faithful members of it to ask, "Now what?" We need to ask that with a sure hope and complete expectation that it will be answered by the Lord, both for us as individuals and together as a community. That must happen together because the answers for the community depend on each of us fulfilling our calling in the future just as we have in getting to where we are today. Great things do not happen from sitting around and waiting for others to do them. They happen when we trust in God, offering ourselves to Him to do His work and His will.


This church has built with big, tall, wide doors. Those doors provide a way for all who seek the Lord to find

their way in here. They also provide a way for us to go out and serve all those in need of spiritual and physical sustenance and hope. The parable of the Good Samaritan in today's Gospel - now also portrayed beautifully as a new icon on our Narthex wall reminds us of that calling and expectation from the Lord. We have done it along the way, and now that the time, energies and resources needed to get to where we are have fulfilled their purpose, it's time to use them in even greater ways as the Good Samaritan's we are called to be in the world. And have no fear, we can do it by God's grace. Again, back to today's Epistle, "God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that you may always have enough of everything and may provide in abundance for every good work."

Glory to God indeed for the great work He has done through the 100 years of faith, love and sacrifices of the families and people of this blessed church. Dear friends, it's not time to wind down from the past 100 years. Let's gear up for the next 100 years as we ask with hope, faith and full assurance in the Lord's answers, "Now what?" Amen.

The Sacred Relics of Our Church



How Orthodoxy's Ancient Rite of Consecration Blesses the Church with More Than Icons

n the early years of Christianity the Church was not allowed to legally exist; for many years the early Christians were persecuted and killed for their faith in Christ. In those days, the Christians met in underground burial places and celebrated the Eucharist on the graves of the martyred Saints. Later, the Church was free to grow and build holy temples for public worship. They were adorned with holy icons, but also the custom of celebrating the Eucharist over the graves of Martyrs continued by placing Holy Relics in the Altar at the time of the Consecration of a Church. The usual practice is to seal the relics of three Martyrs in the center of the Holy Altar Table. In this manner, we are always reminded that the Church was built on the blood of the Martyrs and their faith in the Lord.

When a Church in consecrated in the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese, the relics are provided by the Chancellor out of the sacred repository of Holy Relics located at the Archdiocese. A Certificate of Authenticity verifies which saints have been provided. That Certificate is pictured here.

SAINT BARBARA

THE GREAT MARTYR - FEAST DAY: DECEMBER 4

Saint Barbara was from Heliopolis of Phoenicia and was the daughter of a certain idolater named Dioscorus. When she came of age, she was enlightened in her pure heart by God and secretly accepted belief in the Holy Trinity. About this time Dioscorus began building a bath house, but he was required to go away to attend to certain matters before it was completed. In his absence Barbara directed the workmen to build a third window in addition to the two her Father had commanded. She also inscribed the sign of the Cross with her finger upon the marble, leaving the saving sign cut as deeply into the marble as if it had been done with an iron tool. When Dioscorus returned, he asked why the third window had been added; Barbara began to declare to him the mystery of the Trinity. Because she refused to renounce her faith, Dioscorus tortured Barbara cruelly, and after subjecting her to many sufferings he beheaded her with his own hands, in the year 290 A.D.




SAINT HARALAMBOS

THE HIEROMARTYR - FEAST DAY: FEBRUARY 10

The Holy Hieromartyr Haralambos lived during the reign of Emperor Septimus Severus (194-211 A.D.), when Lucian was the governor, and he was a priest of the Christians of the city of Magnesia. Having taught the way of truth, and preached the faith of Christ, he was condemned by the the pagan Emperor, stripped of his priestly vestments, and the skin of his entire body was scraped. When the governor Lucian saw him bravely enduring these torments, he became enraged, and endeavored to rip the Saint apart with his own hands, but immediately his hands were severed, and were clung to the body of the Martyr. However the Saint prayed for him, and his health was restored. When the executioners Porphyrios and Baptos saw his faith and this miracle, they renounced the idols and believed in Christ. Three women who stood nearby and saw this, also came to believe. The governor captured all of them, and tormented them with various torments, then had them beheaded. At the time of his martyrdom the Saint was 103 old and prayed like the good thief on the Cross, "Remember me, O Lord, in Your kingdom."





SAINT PANTELEIMON

THE GREAT MARTYR & HEALER - FEAST DAY: JULY 27

Saint Pantelimon's father was an idolater, but his mother was a Christian from her ancestors. He was catechized in the faith of Christ and baptized by Saint Hermolaus. Being a trained physician, he practiced it in a philanthropic manner, healing every illness more by the grace of Christ than by medicines. Thus, although his parents had named him "Pantoleon" ("in all things a lion"), because of the compassion he showed for the souls and bodies of all, he was worthily renamed "Panteleimon" ("all-merciful"). On one occasion, he healed not only the eyes of a blind man by calling on the Name of Christ, but he also enlightened the eyes of this man's soul, leading him to become a Christian. When the man was asked by whom and in what manner his eyes had been opened, he confessed with boldness both who the physician was and the manner of his healing. For this he was put to death immediately. Panteleimon was arrested also, and having endured many wounds, he was finally beheaded in the year 305 A.D. Saint Panteleimon is one of the great "Unmercenary" healers.

Consecration Trivia

The icons pictured in this article are from the new iconography of Holy Trinity Church. It was not know when the icons were painted that the relics of those saints would be offered by the Archdiocese for the Consecration!

Consecration Vespers

Friday, November 3, 2023

The sacred services for the Consecration of Holy Trinity Church began with the Consecration Great Vespers on Friday evening. A procession led by the Acolytes entered the Church followed by the clergy and His Eminence Metropolitan Savas, bearing the sacred relics of the Holy Martyrs in a special reliquary box. Entering the Holy Sanctuary, a Paten and lit candle awaited on the bare Holy Altar Table. The relics were venerated and laid on the Paten, which was left there for the remainder of the service and then overnight, awaiting the start of the Consecration Orthros the next morning.



















Consecration Liturgy

Saturday, November 4, 2023

The Consecration of Holy Trinity Church continued early Saturday morning with a special Consecration version of the Orthros and Divine Liturgy. Beautiful Consecration prayers offered supplications to the Lord, such as "Establish and strengthen this Church, protecting it to the end of the world. Renew this Church by your Holy Spirit, that as we offer the bloodless sacrifices in it, we might become partakers of your Holy Spirit." At the beginning of the Divine Liturgy, His Eminence lifted up the Paten containing the Holy Relics and processed around the Church three times, preceded by the clergy, the processional Cross, fans and candles and the Holy Gospel, and followed by all the people. After that, a dramatic re-entry into the Church occurred when the Metropolitan banged his staff against the doors and they were opened for all to follow him in. The service continued with the placing of the Holy Relics inside the Holy Altar table, which was then sealed, washed, anointed and vested. His Eminence then anointed icons on the walls of the Church, including the great Pantokrator icon 65 feet high in the air, which he reached with a helium balloon! The Consecration now complete, His Eminence led the clergy and choir in the continuation and completion of the Divine Liturgy. It was indeed a historic day for all those who participated!




































































# Discernment: The Crown of the Virtues

The more a person progresses in the spiritual life, the more the eyes of his soul will be opened. His mind is polished clean, and he can better discern his own faults, as well as the many blessings of God; he becomes humble; he is broken within; this in turn, naturally brings the Grace of God, divine enlightenment; and discernment is acquired.

#### Geronda, what is discernment?

Discernment is spiritual vision. And spiritual vision is what one who has a purified mind has; this is why he also has spiritual clarity and divine enlightenment.

Geronda, Saint John of the Ladder says, "The eyes of our body are a light for all the bodily members; and the discernment of the divine virtues is a light for the mind."

That is right. You see, if our eyes are healthy, we see clearly, but if our eyes have an ailment, we cannot see well. Our vision is analogous to the health of our eyes. The same thing happens in the spiritual life. Our spiritual health is also analogous to our spiritual vision, our discernment.


## How are the eyes of the soul opened?

Didn't Jesus Christ open the eyes of the blind man with mud? But for the eyes of the soul to be opened, we must throw the mud of sin off of us. If we do not throw away our self and become free of the old man within, but retain self-love, egoism, and the desire to please people, we cannot have spiritual clarity.

The more a person progresses in the spiritual life, the more the eyes of his soul will be opened. His mind is polished clean, and he can better discern his own faults, as well as the many blessings of God; he becomes humble; he is broken within; this in turn, naturally brings the Grace of God, divine enlightenment; and discernment is acquired. Then, he clearly sees what the will of God is in every situation and he does not stumble in his spiritual progress. Indeed, discernment is the steering wheel which guides one securely, such that he will not detour from the straight road and fall off, either to the right or to the left.

#### Geronda, when one starts off with good intentions but something bad happens, does it mean that discernment is missing?

One may start out well, but, if he is not careful, egoism will get involved and lead him astray. When our self,

our ego, enters into our actions, passions are created, and then the devil comes to do his winnowing. This is why you must try to live inwardly, humbly, working inconspicuously in order to obtain divine enlightenment. Whoever lives inwardly, humbly, rises above human triviality, fanaticism and so forth.

# Geronda, how can one love everyone equally and yet love them with discernment?

One can love everyone equally, but he will not express his love to each person in the same way. One is loved from a distance, because that person needs to be kept at a distance; another will be loved up close, according to what will benefit each person. Discernment, divine enlightenment, is the over-arching principle in all circumstances, This is why I always pray for God to provide enlightenment - enlightenment to the people. And so I say, "Lord Jesus Christ, we have lost our home, as well the road which leads there. Enlighten us to find our home, our Father. Give us divine knowledge." \*


